Nearing Completion Of Railway Inquiry
Counsel Hurrying To Complete Data To Ascertain Cost of Road—Mr. Thompson Tells of Arrangements With I.C.R.—Possibilities of Traffic

Ross Thompson, managing director of the construction company, was on the stand for the entire session of the Dugal inquiry into the Valley railway yesterday afternoon. He was examined at length by F. R. Carvell regarding items entering into the cost of the road and also regarding plans for connection with the I. C. R.

Ross Thompson was called when the afternoon session opened. Mr. Carvell asked for copies of the contracts for water tanks and stations, and the witness promised to supply them. He added that Bell, McLaggan & McBean had the two contracts covering all this work except Fredericton and Woodstock. The stations were constructed for in three classes. From Fredericton to Gagetown, the prices for A class stations, complete, were \$2,187; B, \$1,734, and C, \$600.

The contracts included the erection of water tanks. The tubs for these were purchased by the company at \$400 each, vouchers for which and for the fixtures were produced. The estimate for the water stations complete was \$6,000 each. They are, or are to be located at Gagetown, Oromocto, Fredericton, Long's Creek, Balmouth, Cove's Brooks, Woodstock and Lakeville.

On the northern section the contract prices of the stations are: A, \$2,500; B, \$2,000, and C, \$500.

The location of the stations and their prices are as follows: Gagetown, A; Upper Gagetown, B; Oromocto, B; Burton, C; L'Anse-au-Loup, C; Springhill, C; French Village, C; Kingsdale, C; Long's Creek, C; Rosbury, B; Barony, C; Pokok, C; Allandale, C; Temple, C; Meductic, B; Flemming, C; Belleville, C; Lindsay, C; Avondale, C; Lakeville, B, and Centreville, A.

Transcontinental Again.

Mr. Carter interrupted the evidence to make another of his remarks about the Transcontinental. Mr. Carvell mildly suggested that it be allowed to drop while they completed the inquiry into the Valley railway, adding: "If there is one thing on which Mr. Carter and I can agree, it is that the location of the Transcontinental through our section of the country is not where it should be."

This was greeted with laughter, and when Mr. Carter started to reply, the commissioners and other counsel begged him to allow the matter to drop at such an auspicious point.

The witness, continuing, said that Mr. Brown's estimate for station grounds in his division is \$5,000, and Mr. Hill's \$2,500. Mr. Carvell thought that these full amounts could not be included as part of the cost already included in the right of way estimate.

ceded the findings of these two commissions?
A.—We have a ruling stating their power.
Q.—Have you a decision of this joint commission as to what they propose doing?
A.—Yes.
Q.—Do you object to making that public?
A.—No, I have no objection. They claim that they cannot give us running rights as they are a provincial railway and not a Dominion railway. The joint order only gives power to connect or to interchange traffic, but not running rights.
Q.—Do you say you will not build a road into Fredericton?
A.—I will go as far as to say that the Intercolonial have powers that we may be able to take advantage of.
Mr. Carvell was examining on another point when he jokingly remarked that one of his clients would have to pay more than he expected. "I thought," said Mr. Teed, "that you were only counsel for the retiring Mr. Dugal in this matter."
Mr. Carvell—Well, let me tell you that Mr. Dugal is quite a prominent gentleman in the province now.
Mr. Teed—I know he is prominent in the Telegraph but I have not seen that he is prominent anywhere else.
The matter then closed and Mr. Carvell asked the witness about the item of \$100,000 for stations. Of that Mr. Thompson said that \$25,000 was apportioned to round houses, coal station, \$8,000 ice house, \$1,000 and \$30,000 for freight sheds. Witness added that he and Mr. Winslow, of Woodstock, owned about twelve acres of land and Mr. Carvell remarked that the Woodstock station was out in the country.
Witness—There is the chance of it to grow. (Laughter)
Mr. Carvell—if you keep that land until the town grows out to it it will be a long time. Counsel then mentioned that some of the items estimated for would not be too high if the road was being built of the standard it should have been.
Witness—It is being built up to the standard. (Laughter)
Mr. Carvell said he believed the road would receive twice the local traffic that the Transcontinental could get, a remark that caused Mr. Guthrie to ask Mr. Carvell if he had said that in parliament and if it was in fact.
Mr. Carvell remarked that he was glad at any time for his record about the railway he did not think there would be much more than local traffic. There should be through communication at Andover and Fredericton.
Mr. Guthrie—We are going to get these through communications; that is why we want all this land for terminals.
Mr. Carvell—I hope so or the Lord help the province in the matter of interest. (Laughter).
It was mentioned that the commission would probably hear the last of the evidence tomorrow and then Mr. Carvell said that he would be glad to facilitate the hearing of Messrs. McLeod and Bester if they came.
The royal commission then adjourned until 10 o'clock today.

ALLEGED WHITE SLAVER IDENTIFIED BY SYDNEY MAN
(Sydney Record)
Max Wax, a resident of the State of New York, who had for the last seven years been alleged to have been operating in the white slave smuggling traffic between Newfoundland, Canada and the United States, and who, though often suspected, has been able to evade the lynx-eyed immigration sleuths of this continent, has been rounded up and mainly through the instrumentality of John G. Young, immigration agent at the port of Sydney.
Max Wax, who is a Polish Jew, was recently charged with smuggling four undesirable from Newfoundland into the States through the port of Sydney. The objectionable were Polo-Jewish women and were said to be destined for the white slave traffic in New York. These people, accompanied by Wax, came from Newfoundland on the City of Sydney in November of last year, and describing themselves as tourists were reason they were admitted into the port of Sydney, saying their destination was St. John, N. B. They went from Sydney to Woodstock, N. B., remaining there a short time and traveled across the border into Houlton, Me., where they proceeded to New York.
On Saturday John G. Young, immigration agent here, received a hasty call from the department at Ottawa to proceed at once to New York, where his services were required as a witness to identify Max Wax and his lady friends. Leaving Sydney on Sunday night Mr. Young arrived at New York on Tuesday afternoon and was hurried to the court room, where it transpired the lawyers for the prosecution had been sparing time by recalling witnesses and practicing other devices well known to the profession while awaiting his appearance. The case was adjourned after Mr. Young had given his evidence, and on the following day the jury rendered a verdict for the state after twelve minutes' deliberation.
It transpired at the trial that on the City of Sydney Max registered with one of the women as man and wife. Max's own wife and daughter were present at the trial but claimed they knew nothing of the husband's and father's excursion into the domain of white slavery. The case created quite a sensation among the Jewish people of New York.
