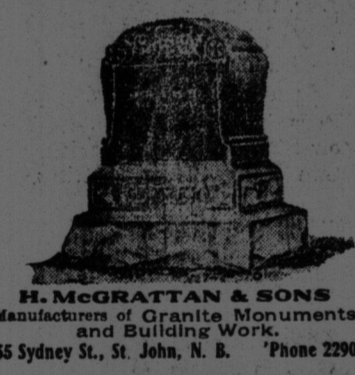

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COMPULSORY EDUCATION

Women's Council Deals With Important Matters VIEWS OF EXPERTS

Old Idea of School System Being Discarded, Says Maine Official -The Servant Girl Question-Objectionable Printed Matter

Montreal, May 6-At today's session of the National Council of Women, the report of the committee on employment for women was presented. Mrs. Short, of Ottawa, said that Canada was not getting the right class of domestic servants now, owing to the better class from the British Isles being exhausted.

Mrs. Liddell presented her report on objectionable printed matter, and said that in Toronto off one plate 30,000 objectionable pictures had been printed. In Victoria books unfit for publication had been found in the stores. One delegate said that motion picture houses were the cause of increased immorality amongst young married women of the middle class.

The delegates were tendered a luncheon at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel, and afterwards gave an automobile drive about the city. This evening they visited the Royal Edward Institute and also held a session with a discussion of compulsory education for women was presented.

Mrs. Hart, of Toronto, as a Catholic, took exception to the tone of a letter from Senator Dandaneau as being unsympathetic to Catholic ears. Being reminded that the senator was a Catholic, she replied that she might be a nominal Catholic, but was not a real one. Mrs. Papadopoulos, of Montreal, as a Catholic, expressed pleasure at the senator's letter.

Mrs. Hart had objected chiefly to the term 'confessional schools.' Payson Smith, a Nova Scotia, a state commissioner of the public schools of Maine, said that compulsory education was only an incidental phase in the wider subject of universal education. The old idea of a school system supported by public funds which tended to the elevation of the individual was being discarded in favor of the new conception of education as a benefit to all society.

Children had too long been told that they should get an education in order that they might escape hard work, and now the social aim in education was becoming predominant.

In adopting compulsory education some states had taken not the regular, but the optional, advance, as the standard, and in Maine a child could be kept at school until the 17th birthday if it had not obtained an elementary education at fifteen years.

Professor Daley, of McGill, said that while the schools were not getting the best results they would never be improved until they were assured for them a regular attendance of pupils and a constant supply of well-trained teachers. The pace of the school was restricted to the slow progress of the irregular attendants, and compulsory attendance would at once remedy this evil.

Mrs. Eliza Ritchie, of Nova Scotia, decried the indifference to education in the maritime provinces as compared to the New England states. In the villages of Nova Scotia she said she and her husband spent most of the time discussing small politics and gave no attention to the vast important subject of their children's schooling.

TOO LATE FOR CLASSIFICATION SUPREME COURT Judgments Given in Ottawa in Several Cases

Ottawa, May 7-The supreme court opened in spring session yesterday and judgments were rendered as follows: British Columbia Electric Railway vs. Vancouver, Victoria & Eastern Railway Company-Appeal dismissed with costs; Duff and Broderick, J., dissenting. Toronto Railway vs. Fleming-Appeal dismissed with costs.

Peters vs. Sinclair-Appeal dismissed with costs; Idington and Duff, J., dissenting. Stone vs. C. P. R.-Appeal allowed with costs, the chief justice dissenting. Nipissing Coco Cola Co. vs. Reinhardt-Appeal dismissed with costs. McGuire vs. Ottawa Wise Vault Co., J., dissenting. Babcock vs. Foley-Reiger Pulp Co.-Appeal dismissed with costs.

Mayberry vs. O'Brien-Appeal dismissed with costs. Parker vs. Martin-Motion to quash dismissed. In the matter of the reference by the governor general in council respecting Alberta railway legislation, the majority of the court answered both questions in the negative. Broderick, J., would answer first question affirmatively, and rendered an answer to the second question unnecessary.

A motion to quash for want of jurisdiction was made in the appeal from the Province of Alberta in the case of Evans vs. Norris. The matter was postponed until the hearing upon its merits. Six cases on the Quebec list were postponed until after the completion of hearings in the Ontario list. Gratton vs. La Banque D'Hotelaria was then taken up.

ONE OF SEVENTEEN CHILDREN. The Ottawa, Maine, Enterprise says:—The death of Mrs. Eliza A. Perry, widow of Jaman Perry, occurred in the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. H. Lancaster on Monday morning after a long illness. She was seventy-five years of age and for several years had made her home with her daughter. She leaves one daughter, Mrs. E. H. Lancaster, three sons, Charles Perry of this city, Herbert and Harry Perry of Moncton, N. B., and five brothers, Isaac and Almon Sanborn of Stillwater; Leroy S. Sanborn of Argyle; Willis H. Sanborn of Bangor, and Fred Sanborn of Fairfield. Mrs. Perry's mother, Mrs. Dorcas N. Sanborn, was one of a family of seventeen children, and she, in turn, raised a family of seventeen. Mrs. Perry's parents, not satisfied with raising seventeen children of their own, in their later years adopted two, thus showing their kindly and charitable disposition.

HIGH PRICE FOR BEEF. Sackville Post:—Does farming pay? Well sometimes it does, as for instance:—A few days ago Walter Dixon sold to George F. Estabrooks two yearling steers for the sum of \$65. Mr. Estabrooks has not slaughtered the animals yet, but he estimates that they will weigh 800 pounds. Twelve cents per pound live weight is a pretty fancy price for yearlings. And yet some of our friends maintain that farming does not pay.

SARDINES FROM CHAMCOOK. An Eastport letter says:—Charles Haycock, who holds a responsible position with the Canadian Sardine Co., at Shamcook, is on a business trip to London and is expected back next week. Work is making at the new plant and recently a shipment of several hundred cases of sardines were sent to London from St. John, N. B.
