



In co-ordination with St. George's Society, Trafalgar Day was duly ob-served at St. John. The matter of reparations due to widows of seamen who lost their lives in the war received consideration from the local branch and information there-on was forwarded to the President of the Dominion Executive who presented the subject to the Educational com-mittee of the British Navy League. Through the press of the Province, the importance of keeping watch on all matters pertaining to sea power and to our association with the Mother-land, has been presented in a series of articles. 


