

D. W. CAMPBELL OF MONTREAL IS DEAD AT AGE OF 64

Campbell, with whom he had come in close touch in the early days of Saint John as a winter port of Canada.

"My first acquaintance with Mr. Campbell," said the Commissioner, "was when he came here and urged that work on berths 1 and 2 be rushed along as he felt sure satisfactory arrangements would be made for the opening of the Beaver Line to Saint John."

"Since that time he had taken a keen interest in the port and Saint John could count on his support in any move for better facilities and additional trade through the port."

Mr. Campbell was 64 years old. He had been superintendent of the Canadian Pacific steamships services in Montreal from 1903 to 1905, and was well known all over Canada as an authority on shipping problems.

REVENUE FOR YEAR SHOWED DECLINE

Customs Figures Here For Fiscal Period Compared With Previous.

The receipts at the local Customs House for the fiscal year closed March 31, showed a decrease of \$408,074.70 from the previous year, according to figures compiled here. Customs excise and steamship inspection fees fell off while Marine Dues and pilotages charged increased slightly.

Some Figures.

The receipts during the year closed March 31 were \$4,165,406.75 while for the previous year they were \$4,573,481.48. There was falling off in the Customs excise of \$2,000,000.33 in 1924-25 to \$4,095,676.24 in 1924-25. Pilotage however showed an increase from \$47,999.50 in the previous year to \$49,999.50 last year. Fees for the inspection of steamships fell away from \$4,885 to \$2,595.

So far as customs excise was concerned March 1925 was the best of the year when \$606,640.17 was collected, against \$593,242.78 for the corresponding month of the year before. The marine dues showed an increase from \$15,450.68 in 1924-25 to \$17,270.99 in the year just closed.

N. B. AREAS WILL BE PICTURED FROM AIR

About 80,000 Square Miles in Canada to be Photographed This Year.

OTTAWA, Ont., April 3.—Surveys, covering approximately 80,000 square miles, will be undertaken by the Royal Canadian Air Force this year, in conjunction with the topographical surveys branch of the Department of the Interior. The force will also do considerable work in the photographing of Canadian historic sites. In New Brunswick the Fredericton section will be photographed.
