TO LIFT THE BAN NEXT THURSDAY

Shipman and Vicinity.

Dr. Hays says the influenza has almost entirely abated. This district was hit very bad. He understands that the same report applies to Minto, where the epidemic was severe.

St. Stephen and Vicinity.

Only a few scattered cases, Dr. Landy reports, where there were from 2,000 to 3,000 about ten days ago. Possibly 100 could be total today. This report covers parishes of Dundas, Wellington, St. Mary and part of Buctouche.

Sawick and Vicinity.

Dr. Morehouse reports that where there were 250 cases in an area forty miles long by ten wide there are now possibly not more than twenty.

Stanley, York Co. and Vicinity.

Dr. Demps reports only one case of pneumonia and possibly two cases of influenza. When he took up that field a short while ago there was influenza in almost every home—hundreds of cases—4th whole families in many instances.

West from Westfield to John O's.

Dr. Jack, of Glenwood, says his experience with the influenza was chiefly about the railway construction work at Westfield. All told he had forty cases from Westfield to John O. westward, at Evansville. The epidemic is practically not felt along this side the river and for that matter the east side of the Long Reach escaped as well.

Immunon and Vicinity.

Dr. Laporte says there have been no cases for a fortnight in the town of Immunon and no new ones for a week the outside districts. In the parishes of St. Basil, St. Jacques and St. Hilaire there were from 300 to 400 cases each a short while ago and from 800 to 1,000

cases in the town. Down at St. Leonard's there is a general abatement as well. Things are now considered next to normal.

Andover and Vicinity.

Dr. McIntosh says health matters are now very quiet with very little influenza. Dr. McIntosh has had as many as 200 cases in his own practice, eighty of which were among Indians.

St. Stephen and Locality.

Dr. Gray reports everything clearing up nicely in St. Stephen and Milltown, also in the back country. Possibly fifty cases would cover the whole situation. They were calling everything "flu" in this section, but twenty of the cases coming under his notice were really severe. The local health authorities put on the closing ban a week earlier than the government, which evidently proved a wise move, for the American side of the river has suffered four times as much as the Canadian.

St. George and Coast Villages.

Dr. Taylor reports only three or four families affected in St. George and quite a clean bill of health. However there are still a prevalence of influenza at Black Bay. Latet's Black's Harbor, Scully's Cove, Pennfield and Lepreau, but not any great aggregate of cases. There are a few cases at Georgetown, Second Falls and Bonny River. On the whole the situation is not bad.

Hardland and Vicinity.

Dr. McIntosh reports quite an epidemic of ten days ago has now decreased to less than 100 cases in this area. Only a few fresh cases have developed of late. There has been considerable pneumonia with six or seven deaths.

Chatham and Vicinity.

Dr. Duffy says conditions in the town are not bad but a short while ago there were many serious cases and five deaths from pneumonia. In the outlying districts conditions were much worse, about 250 cases in the district when the epidemic was at its height. Not many fresh cases now and all of very mild type. People are getting wise to the proper form of early treatment.

Pretty Bad in Bathurst Locality.

Dr. Coffin says conditions are greatly improved in the town but the outlying districts are still bad with plenty of fatal pneumonia. Roundabout Bathurst village there are nearly settlements where the epidemic is still quite severe, the country people seeming to disregard the precautionary measures and going out into the air when suffering from early stages of influenza. Therefore the mortality is high. These districts are badly off for help, as local people are dreadfully frightened and will not go near the lumber camp areas of the McLean operations on the Nepisiquit River there are pitiable conditions. At the time of reporting (Wednesday evening) seven lumbermen were in a dying condition in one camp alone. These camps are reached by auto and horseback as they are located about thirty miles in the woods. Dr. Dougherty and a French medical graduate of McGill are on this job, also Father Wheaton, Catholic priest, another priest, Father Boutour, has succumbed to the disease. Protestant clergymen are working as nurses and have no thought of opening up their

churches until everything is cleared up. Bathurst has an emergency hospital. Dr. Coffin in conclusion, reports that in his opinion the epidemic is now well in hand and is practically under control.

Shipman and Locality.

In this thickly populated area the influenza has been ravaging with high mortality at Shipman and Minto. Two doctors are struggling with the disease but they have a large tract of territory to serve. However, there are most encouraging signs of abatement.

St. John's and Roundabout.

Dr. Calkin reports the situation greatly improved, with only two or three cases in the town and a general clearing up in the surrounding country. At one time there were between 300 and 400 cases in the town alone, seventy of which were in the Ladies' College (Mount Allison). In fact, Dr. Calkin feels sure three-quarters of the people here had the influenza in one degree or another.

Dorchester and Vicinity.

Dr. Gaudet reports the epidemic abating most satisfactorily. At the height there were 1,000 cases, now only about 100. There has been a high rate of mortality and the influenza has been complicated with pneumonia, typhoid, diphtheria and meningitis, also erysipelas.

Campbellton Locality.

Dr. McPherson says the epidemic has been reduced from sixty to eighty per cent in the town and county. At one time there were 800 cases in a radius of six to ten miles of the town. Very bad at the Indian reserve, also down at Metapedia. Very few new cases now, possibly three or four per day.

Rogersville Situation.

Dr. Hechey reported that conditions are still bad in this isolated place with 300 cases out of a population of 2,500. The disease is about in the middle of its course. A young physician is assisting Dr. Hechey, who has only recently recovered himself and whose wife is still very ill.
