DEVELOP, SAYS BORDEN.

Conservation Must Not Mean Locking Up Resources.

Toronto, Jan. 6.—R. L. Borden has an aching arm this morning. He shook hands warmly, yet vigorously, with three thousand people last night in the banquet room of the King Edward Hotel.

Easily that number of local party enthusiasts passed through the main door of the banquet room with the sole object of being introduced to the Conservative leader.

Prominent Conservative workers considered the function more successful and less tiresome than a banquet. It showed more animation all through, imposed no restraint on anyone, and gave everyone a chance to shake hands with the "R.L." and to receive his hearty "Happy New Year," or "God Bless You, Brother."

Mr. Borden devoted the greater part of his address at the Canadian Club yesterday to the question of conservation of the national resources. He called attention to the awakening in this respect in the United States, and the results of the conference held there. He had himself been utterly astounded at the lack of information regarding Canadian forestry, and had to rely on a United States writer. He hoped and believed the Canadian Conservation Commission would do splendid work. The improvidence of methods attending the exploitation of minerals in the United States was a subject for comment. Every ton of anthracite coal mined involved a loss of a ton and a half, and a loss of a ton of bituminous for each ton of that quality. He was glad that in Nova Scotia nothing like this occurred.

Canadians did not want their resources locked up. They wanted them developed. Canada should go back 800 years to the methods of William the Conqueror. He quoted Burke to the effect that the nation was a partnership between the living, those who had lived and those who were to be born. In that spirit the conservation of Canada's resources should be carried on.

The doctrine of civic responsibility was the last topic. The Yale foundation lectures on this subject offered an example for some of our Canadian millionaires to follow. There could be no worthier work, said Mr. Borden. Men owed a duty to God, to their families and to themselves, but they owed a duty also to their country.

"If politics are dirty, whose fault is it?" Yours. Whose duty is it to cleanse them? Your own," was a statement that called forth applause. Mr. Borden thought there should be instruction in the schools on the duties of citizenship. The normal political actions of the nations, so long as it was manifested in the party system, demanded that every young man ally himself with one party or another.

Sir James Whitney moved a vote of thanks. He hesitated to break the spell of such a splendid deliverance. He had the enthusiasm of conviction about the value of Canadian clubs and the address they had heard.

Sir George Ross cordially endorsed Sir James' approval of the club. Were it not that Canadians had been so successful in the past in disposing of large problems, he would almost despair of success in dealing with those of such magnitude as Mr. Borden had mentioned.

Besides the guest there were seated with the chairman: President McKay, Sir George Ross, Sir James Whitney, Senator Kerr, Senator Jaffray, Hon. Geo. E. Foster, Hon. W. J. Hanna, Hon. R. A. Pyne, Hon. J. O. Reame, E. B. Osler, M.P., Claude Macdonnell, M.P., W. K. McNaught, M.P., Mayor Geary, W. J. Douglass. The attendance was a record.

Special Train For Lynchers.

Vicksburg, Miss., Jan. 6.—Because a railroad company furnishes a special train to a party of men, and it is used to convey a mob bent on lynching the railroad company cannot be held liable for damages.

In effect this decision was rendered by Judge Niles in the U. S. District Court in a suit brought by Mrs. Annie Rogers, whose husband was lynched at Tallulah, Louisiana, several years ago. She sought the recovery of \$50,000 from the Vicksburg, Shreveport and Pacific Railway.

Charged With Murder.

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 6.—The grand jury in the Los Angeles Times' explosion case returned 22 indictments late yesterday. All of the indictments charge murder in connection with that crime. It is not likely that the names of the indicted will be made public until after the arrests are made. It is believed that a large number of San Franciscans have been indicted.

A Strike Victim.

Chicago, Jan. 6.—Another name was added to the death list of the garment workers' strike on Wednesday, when Sarah Gibbs, a 19-year-old striker, died at a hospital as a result of cold and exposure during her service as a strike picket and as a news girl for the benefit of the strikers.

Forbidden to Wear Button.

Winnipeg, Jan. 6.—The Winnipeg Electric Street Railway Co. has issued orders forbidding union conductors and motormen to wear their union buttons on duty. One union man was discharged Wednesday for calling a strike-breaker working on another car a "scab."

Brantford, Jan. 6.—The Brantford Trades and Labor Council have elected the following officers for the year: President, Thomas Cooper; vice-president, William Morrison; recording secretary, William Jones; financial secretary, B. R. Pearce; secretary, J. C. Cole.

Brantford, Jan. 6.—Mrs. Thomas Henry, a well-known resident of Waterford, yesterday morning stepped into an open hatchway, and falling into the cellar, sustained fatal injuries.

CHARACTER SKETCHES

Just south of the Ellis Furniture Factory you will notice a rough east house, the present home of Dr. Canfield, who by the way is a fine type of professional christian gentleman. This house in 1852, when Ingersoll was a village, was the home of the late John McDonald. He was one of the leading men of the place, both in a business and public way. He was large in stature and equally large-hearted, in fact the latter feature was his chief characteristic. He was a successful business man in the dry-goods trade, in which only a few ever succeed. His late heart found expression in two principal directions; first, he was the devoted friend of the newly arrived immigrants and many a man has he befriended, who often reached the place with a large family, but with a small and sometimes well nigh empty pocket and very much in need of just such a friend as the man whose character I am sketching this week. To see him meet such a family, as I have just described, would almost lead you to believe that he had

met with one of the friends of his childhood, for after looking the situation over, he would open his heart and pocket to help the needy folk. In fact his kind consideration became so well known in this direction that the station agent of the Great Western Railway of those days, Mr. John Wilkie, would generally send the late arrival to Mr. McDonald, knowing that he had put him on the right track to help him to get a start in the new world. However, I think it was in another direction of activity that he found his chief enjoyment. Those were the days of slavery in the Republic to the South, and what was known as the underground railway was the chief means of communication between the slave and his bondage and our own beloved Canada, so when some slave had used this means of escape from the hands of his hard task master and would reach this place in some way he would soon find out John McDonald, who would at once provide for his temporary wants and then do his best to bring him in touch with some one who required his services. Some of these slaves had had a wonderful experience in making their escape from their grinding bondage, the blood hound would very likely be on their track. They

had hid in some swamp or wood in the day and only travelled by night, with very often nothing to guide them but the North Pole Star and that was not always shining, and it was worthy of the highest dramatic art to hear John McDonald recount their experiences to his Scotch friends from the North, who came to his store to do their trading. Of one thing I am quite sure, the story would not suffer at the hands of the story-teller.

While he was Mayor of the Town I sat in the council with him. He held pronounced views upon every public question, but no matter how he might differ with you he would always hold the scales of justice with an even balance as the presiding officer of the council. Now, I am just wondering that after all I have not passed by the feature in his make-up, which was the most to be admired. He was particularly fond of children and since like begets like I need scarcely add that children were fond of him. He generally had some cakes or sweets in his pockets, and good big pockets they were, to deal out to the little ones, and if you were out on the street when the children were passing to and fro to school you would be pretty sure to see him the centre of a group of scholars to whom he would impart some simple truth to help them to better walk along the pathway of life.

Such men never die. They are touched with the bloom of eternal youth and will live forever like the pebble cast into life's great ocean or whose vibration will not be lost until it has touched the most distant shore of time.
