CITY.

THANKSGIVING DAY in the city passed off quietly with the exception of some slight disturbances which occurred on Brussels street.

A PANE of glass, valued at \$60 was broken by a signboard which was being put over Mr. Skinner's store, King street, Tuesday.

DIED FROM INJURIES—Robert McLaughlin, who some time since fell from the roof of Perkins' building, Prince Wm. street, died on Saturday last from the effects of his injuries.

PERSONAL—The Rev. W. F. Chapman left for Johnville, on Thursday morning.

Rev. A. Guellette is on a visit to New York.

RECKAWAY—A horse attached to a carriage containing Chas. Follows and Mr. Parks, ran away on Jeffrey's hill, Tuesday night, smashing the carriage. The occupants were only slightly injured.

METTY THIEF—As thefts of the above kind are becoming so numerous in the Country Market, of late, we think the Chief of Police should at least, for the next two months, keep a policeman stationed there.

McCarthy lost a son fourteen years of age. Mr. B. J. Driscoll, lumber dealer, lost a fine little girl aged over six years, and Mr. J. Robson, Jr., a fine little boy.

KIDNAP TREASURE—Messrs. Capt. Price and Michael Calhane were interviewed on Sunday, on the ferry boat, by a man who believes he has discovered Capt. Kold's treasure. The Capt. promised him the assistance of Michael to dig it up. The poor fellow felt grateful and promised to return at an appointed time to show them the spot.

CARELESSNESS—A most respected resident of Carleton, speaking of the late Railway accident, informs us that he went over that line about two months ago and witnessed a careless act on the part of the official. He saw a bundle of hay thrown off one place and a barrel of flour at another, without the train being stopped.

OFF TO FLORIDA—Mr. Cornelius Harrison and his sister started last week on a tour of pleasure to Florida. Mr. Harrison has been engineer of Gregory's mill for some time past, and well liked by all the employees. His health at present is not being all that desired, he has taken the above method of recreating it. We wish him a pleasant journey.

DANCERS—The ladies and gentlemen who were attending the social quadrille assembly at the City Hall on Monday evening last, came very near having no music, the musicians who were engaged failing to put in an appearance. Very luckily, however, it was one of the practice nights of the Carleton Serravallo Band and they kindly furnished music for the evening. These assemblies are largely attended and well conducted.

LECTURE—A lecture will be delivered in St. Patrick's Hall, Carleton, on Sunday evening next, under the auspices of the St. John Baptist Society. The Rev. J. McDevitt, pastor of St. Peter's, Portland, will be the lecturer. This society is well deserving of the attention of all the Catholic young men of Carleton, and we hope their members will largely increase. At the last meeting of the society Mr. Patrick Walsh was elected President, Mr. John Rosseter resigning.

INVESTIGATION—It was rumored around the streets on Tuesday that owing to a disagreement between the Directors of the Carleton Branch Railway and J. Murray Kaye Esq., relative to some work needed and which Mr. Kaye refused to do, that the Directors proposed to the city for the purpose of putting on an injunction. After consultation with the powers that be, it was arranged satisfactorily. Would it not be as well for the Directors acting for the people to tell out to the St. John and Maine Co., and thereby aid the people of that colony railway tax they now have to pay without any return.

LET THERE BE LIGHT—On the arrival of the ferry boat on Tuesday evening on the Western side of the harbor, the night was very dark and a heavy wind prevailed. Among the passengers was a very elderly lady who received a very severe fall across the portion of the platform lately built by the St. John & Maine Railway Co., as it is rather higher than the other. We would suggest again to the vest side members the advisability of the calling a public meeting of the citizens at an early day, say at the City Hall, for the purpose of taking the view of the people relative to the matter of lighting all the streets in Carleton with lamps. The cost per capita on each rate-payer would be trifling. All it needs is action.

JOHNVILLE.—As announced in last week's HERALD, the Rev. W. F. Chapman addressed the people belonging to the Catholic congregation in the Church of the Assumption after vespers, last Sunday, on the advantages and disadvantages of people taking farms in the Johnville settlement. After describing the character of the soil and locality of the place, he detailed the progress made by those settlers who are located there. There are 130 families there already, four schools, one church and a priest, so that they need have no fear of laboring under any disadvantages, from a religious point of view. He considered even if a man had to suffer a little for a few years, if he persevered and remained "as 's' yam," in the end his lot would be crowned with success. He said that the prohibition was the motto in Johnville, as there is no liquor sold there, but there is plenty of good spring water, and considering it a good place to locate, as they would have a strong claim to abandon the habit. He contrasted the difference between city and country life, and said that there was a vast difference in the appearance of the people of this city and those of Johnville. A large number of strangers were present and his remarks were attentively listened to. Judging by the number of people who have been falling "Johnville" during the week, we would not be surprised to hear of a number of them "starting" for there at an early day.

PROVINCIAL.

DIPHTHERIA has been raging in Moncton since it has a new railway dining saloon in the spring.

The Sackville Borderer has entered up on its twenty-third volume.

The Queen Hotel, Moncton, was robbed of some clothing and a trunk, Saturday night.

LEO BROOKS—A Moncton freeman, named Blair Bonier, broke his leg while jumping out of a wagon last Sunday.

FIRE—The store of D. Vaughan, St. Martin's, was totally destroyed, Tuesday morning. Loss heavy; no insurance on either stock or building.

ACCIDENT—Jas. Naines, an engine driver on a freight train from Moncton to Turo, had the forefinger of his right hand taken off while oiling his engine, Wednesday evening.

It is expected that the work on the interior of the Moncton Catholic Church will be so far advanced that Rev. Father Foley will be in the main part of it to-morrow.

THE McCarry murder trial is still going on at Dorchester. Nothing new has been elicited. Some of the evidences published in the newspapers is inexcusable by bad taste and should be omitted.

BERNARD, the Indian, who some time ago committed the assault on Mrs. Wilson, at Hillsboro, has pleaded guilty at this month's session of the County Court of Albert, and has been sentenced for ten years to the Penitentiary.

MURDER—A Mrs. Seeger, Ring street, Brookton, disappeared from her home, Thursday evening. Some think she walked over one of the wharves while others believe she is with friends somewhere about that city.

This steamer "Star" grounded on a mud flat in the Washbrook Lake, on Saturday evening. She was got off on Monday morning and started for St. John. She left Indianville on her last trip for the season, Wednesday morning. The "Bouling" on her trip to Fredricton the same evening also grounded and was got off, Sunday morning. All the river steamers are now laid up for the winter.

The W. A. murder trial, at St. Andrews, was concluded on Tuesday. The prosecution was by the Attorney General, Mr. T. D. Dwyer and Mr. Ward were found guilty on circumstantial evidence. It was asked if they had any reason to offer why the sentence of the Court should not be passed on them, David said I have nothing to say only what I said before.

I stand before the Lord not guilty; Mrs. Ward said "I declare before God, I do not know anything about my husband as God is my Judge." Then according to the usual form, the prisoners were sentenced to be hanged within the precincts of the jail, on Tuesday, January 14th. On receiving sentence, Mrs. Ward burst into tears and David became pale and had to grasp the rail of the dock to steady himself.

On Wednesday morning David made the following confession to the jailer—I killed Ward in the valley where his remains were found. I killed him with McCarthy's new axe. Ward was on his way home with an axe and pitchfork. When we met, we had no words; he made at me with the fork; I clinched the axe and killed him. I then took him by the legs and dragged him to where his remains were found. Mrs. Ward never saw him after he left the house till she saw him dead in the woods, nor anyone else but myself.

He has made a second statement in presence of the Sheriff, Warden O'Dell, and Geo. B. Grimmer, Esq., as follows:—About 4 o'clock on the afternoon of the 9th September last I was returning from berrying, and met a drove of cows, and, fearing that Mulher's bull was with them, I made a detour to avoid him, as he was a dangerous animal. I came on the meadow road at the rising ground beyond the gully. There I met Ward with a pitchfork and an axe with him. I asked Ward how he was getting on having, Ward replied, "I have been having and will never make any more hay." I said "I have been berrying." Ward then said, "You will never get berry again; I will kill you." He made a pass at me with the pitchfork. I laid hold of him and got him down. We tussled for some time, finally Ward promised to make up friends. We walked along the road together, and when we reached the gully, Ward struck at me again with the pitchfork. I ran around the bushes and he followed me. I then seized the axe and knocked him down. I ran away a short distance. I turned, came back and finished him. I was afraid at the time. I then dragged the body by the legs into the bushes. I buried the hat in the swamp between the body and the road. Ward knew nothing about it then or now.

David cried in prison all the first night after being sentenced. Mrs. Ward's sentence will likely be commuted to imprisonment.

DOMINION ITEMS.

Hon. Wm. McDougall is to be Speaker of the House of Commons.

The Provincial Prohibitory Conference met in Halifax, next Thursday.

Wednesday, Dec. 4th, is to be Thanksgiving day throughout the Dominion.

A man named Kolros, accidentally cut an artery at Ottawa, on Tuesday last, and bled to death.

On Thursday, Postmaster-General Laflamme, was elected for the constituency of Three Rivers, by acclamation.

An expert Boston pickpocket named Ryan was arrested at Halifax, Thursday afternoon, after committing a number of robberies.

A NEW QUARRY is to be opened near King's Mills, Mi-quo Cove, by a Mr. McDonald. About forty men will be employed during the winter.

Mr. Donald A. Gille, an old and much respected resident of Moncton, P. E. I., ruptured a blood vessel the other day, resulting in instant death.

A sailor named Collins, of H. M. S. "Belcherophon" at Halifax, fell from the yard arm to the deck and dashed his brains out by striking on one of the lugs of guns.

A painter named Thos. Kennedy, fell down the stairs of a Halifax engine house, Monday afternoon, and was seriously injured. He was for a time insensible.

On Monday night, the Schr. "Emblem," of Yarmouth, sprang a leak off Shelburne Harbor, N. S., and was abandoned. The vessel sank shortly after; crew saved.

W. H. Baldwin, photographer, a former resident of St. Stephen, fell off the roof of a three story building in San Francisco, Cal., recently and was almost instantly killed.

It is reported that Mr. Brydges is to be removed from the charge of Government railways and is to be appointed Superintendent of the Quebec Government railways.

A number of English laboring emigrants arrived at Halifax this week, having left Newfoundland to which place they were induced to come out but failed to find work there.

A man named Hector McNeil was fatally stabbed at a dance near Baddeck, Cape Breton, by a Peter McNeil and lived but a short time. After the murderer had committed the deed he escaped but gave himself up next day.

At Charlottetown, P. E. I. youth, John Sheenestor was accidentally shot last Saturday morning by a gun in the hands of a companion named Scantlebury. A large portion of the charge—goose shot—lodged in his stomach.

On Monday night, near Antigonish, N. S., H. A. Rand, map agent, was dragged from his wagon by some ruffians, died hand and foot and then robbed of \$200. Rand managed to unlodge his hands but too late to get any clue of the robbers.

Sir A. T. Galt has accompanied Mr. Tilley to England. It is understood that his mission is to confer with Her Majesty's government as to the best means of opening up and developing Canadian trade with the British and Foreign West Indies.

It is said that Hon. Mr. Tilley, Finance Minister, while in England will ask the Imperial Government to assist the Canadian Pacific Railway by a grant of Six Million Pounds Sterling, the Railway being an undertaking of vast Imperial consequence.

Expatriate Duffness, advocate belonging to Three Rivers, P. E. I., disappeared mysteriously from his attorney's or board's stables at Montreal recently. He had a large sum of money about him and is believed to be the victim of foul play.

The Duke of Edinburgh landed at Halifax, at 11 o'clock, Wednesday, and was received by a guard of Honor of the 9th

Regiment. He was driven to the military head quarters, Barrington street, where a reception was held for the officers of the garrison.

Sir John A. Macdonald, accompanied by Hon. Dr. Tupper, C. B. Hon. L. F. R. Masson, Hon. James McDonald, Hon. MacKenzie Bowell, Hon. Senator Atkins, Hon. John O'Connor, Hon. Dr. Robitaille, Sir Hugh Allen, Hon. Judge Ritchie, Lieutenant-General Sir Selby Smythe and Mr. Edw. Guy Selby Smythe, A. D. G., arrived in a special train at Halifax on Thursday morning, and were welcomed at the station by many friends.

ACCIDENTS—Michael McCormick, a youth of 16 years, had part of the thumb and the whole of the forefinger of the left hand cut off with a new while working at a stove machine in Miller and Woodman's mill, Spurr Cove, Lancaster, Monday evening. On Saturday afternoon, a Moncton machine shop employee, was severely injured by being struck in the eye with a splinter of iron. Mr. Robt. Morrison and son were injured on Monday, by the accidental discharge of a gun which they had in the wagon with them Sussex.

The official programme arranged for the day of the landing at Halifax of the Princess Louise and the Marquis of Lorne is as follows:—They will proceed in state to the Provincial Building, where the Marquis of Lorne will be sworn in by Judge Ritchie as Governor General of the Dominion of Canada. The City's address will be presented His Excellency immediately afterwards. His Excellency and Her Royal Highness will then proceed to Admiralty House. They will dine with His Honor the Lieutenant Governor of N. B. at 3 o'clock and at 9:30 p. m. a "Drawing Room" will be held at Government House. Next day, His Excellency and Her Royal Highness will visit objects of interest in and about the City. At 2:30 p. m. His Excellency will receive addresses and hold a levee immediately after at the Provincial Building. The Marquis and Lady will dine at Maplewood, at 8 p. m., being escorted by the Princess's Household Procession from Admiralty House to the park on South Park street. Next day the Vice-Royal party will leave Halifax by the Intercolonial Railway at 11 a. m. It is understood the official landing will not take place until 24 hours after the arrival of the S. S. Sarnatan.
