## RUSSIA'S FORCE IN THE FAR EAST

DESCRIBED BY ONE OF RECENT ARRIVALS

Forty Ships Seen on Review at Port Arthur - Many Forts Being Constructed.

Peter Morlk, an engineer who recently took a man-of-war out to the Far East from Copenhagen, Denmark, for the Russian government tells an interesting story of what is going on at Port Arthur and Vladivostock.

Mr. Morlk arrived on the belated Riojun Maru Saturday, and is on his return home via New York. He has spent some time at the two ports men-tioned, and was one of those who witnessed the big review of the Russian men-of-war at Port Arthur in Septem-ber. There had been a review of a minor character in June, but that which took please. took place in September was a most sig-nificant event, illustrating as it did the strong naval power which Russia nowhas on the Pacific and the absolute impregnability of the fortified port. Mr. Morlk says that there were forty vessels on review, all in fighting trim. They attacked the port at night. The port was blocked, and an attempt made to effect an entirance, but in vain. It is impossible for two ships to pass at the entrance to the port. While the harbor itself is large enough to accommodate the whole fleet. It is surrounded by a chain of mountains, which are strongly fortified with modern guns, and in the estimation of Mr. Morik no fleet afloat

could take the strenghold.
