



BOSTON, April 11.—Hereafter the alien will find difficulty in securing his naturalization papers from the clerk of the United States district court, and owing to the efforts of the immigra-tion department and the act of con-gress on March 3, several clauses have been inserted by which the would-be ditizen must swear that he is not an amarchist or possessed of anarchistic motives. This new paper, with which is attached several important clauses, will be put in the clerk's office on June 1, when the new law will go into effect.

ST. JOHNS, N. F., April 21.- The sai fabery this year will result in a total catch of at least 55,000 eshis, as against 274,000 smals caught last year. The price this year is higher. 
