IMPERIAL DEFENSE
CONFEREES DISAGREE
Each Dominion's Delegates
Have Policy of Their Own
"Things are Going the Wrong Way," Says

fence conference met again at the for-
eign office to resume the discussion on
the naval memorandum. This branch

selves competent to discuss the minutiae
of naval or military questions. Prob-
ably a great deal of discussion in detail
in committee will be necessary to agree
on any perfected plan of action.

FOUR PERISH
BY DROWNING
P. E. Islanders Go Down in
Seven Feet of Water.
Punt Leaks and Fills—All Jump Into the
Water—Four are Drowned
and Four Saved.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Aug.
5.—One of the worst drowning ac-
cidents in the history of Charlottetown
occurred at three o'clock this after-
noon off Rocky Point shore, about
three miles from the city, and near
the entrance of the harbor. Four men
perished. Ephraim Gallant, aged 45,
president of the Laborers' Protective
Union; Harry Gallant, 23; James Bur-
nett, 25; Dan McAuley, 24, the first
named being the only married man.
They were all members of the League
of the Cross, a temperance society in
connection with the Roman Catholic
