# S300 WORTH OF LOOT TAKEN

Had Made Big Haul from Tug Pejepscot When Police Intervened--Surrendered Goods When Facing Prosecution--David Cowles Hopeful of Raising Vessel--Underwriters' Agent Here.

Robbery of various articles from the tug Pejebscot, which was recently wrecked off Cape Spencer, has been discovered, with the result that the matter has been placed in the hands of the local police, who have already succeeded in locating and recovering property to the value of almost \$300.

When the tug went down, many articles carried on deck were driven ashore. In addition to this a lot of valuable property, chiefly consisting of rope, copper and brass piping, and other articles of steamship equipment which were saved, had been piled up on the beach. On Saturday when the wreoking party went down to the tug, it was discovered that most of the goods were missing.

The local police were notified and on Sunday afternoon Detective P. Killen, accompanied by David S. Cowles, president of the Sagadahoc Towing and Pejebscot Paper Company, droved down to the scene of the wreck, and in a very short space of time traced the robbery to the camps and homes of fishermen in the vicinity. 
