OLDFIELD WON FIRST FIGHT

Famous Auto Driver Breaks Record at Meet from Which He Was Debarred by National Association.

Readville, Mass., Oct. 14.—Barney Oldfield scored his first point in opposition to the American automobile association, the governing body in this country, by breaking the Readville track record for one mile today at a regularly sanctioned meet, from which he was supposed to be debarred owing to his recent disqualification by the association. Driving his Benz, "Blitzen" machine at a break neck speed of better than a mile a minute, Oldfield covered the mile circuit in 50 seconds flat. The former record was 54 seconds, made by Ralph D. Palma in a Fiat June 17, 1908. Oldfield's time is not official, and will not be accepted by the association. It is authentic, however, for it was taken by four stop watches, two of which caught it under 50 seconds. Oldfield's disqualification, which precipitated today's conflict between the representatives of the governing body and the driver, grew out of the cancellation by the association of the racing license recently granted to "Jack" Johnson, the pugilist. Oldfield had contracted for a match race with the heavy weight, and announced after the latter's license had been rescinded that he intended fulfilling his part of the agreement. This led to his own loss of official standing. It was an Oldfield day at the Readville track. Oldfield's Knox stock car, which was driven by Ben Kirchner, won the feature event of the day, a one hour race, travelling 52 3/4 miles. Edward Beverly, in a Simplex, was second, only 3 1/2 mile behind, and A. W. Rogers was third in another Simplex, a mile in the rear of his mate. But two other events were run off, the programme being shortened by darkness. Nelson Slater, a Worcester amateur in a Lancia car, won a five mile match with a Fire Stone Columbus, driven by John Scuyler, covering the distance in 5 minutes 40 1/2 seconds. "Speedy" White, at the wheel of a Cameron machine, defeated George Donahue, in a Moon, in five minutes, 39 seconds. The distance was five miles.

CORRIDEN NOT TO BLAME FOR LAJOIE'S HITS

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 14.—"I found that Corriden had a perfectly logical and, as I believe, an absolutely truthful explanation of the reason why Lajoie made so many hits," said President Johnson after his interview with the St. Louis player. "There has been some misrepresentation over the character of the hits. One that was represented as a bunt, was a low, rife drive which it would have been dangerous to field. Others were cleverly placed bunts that a veteran fielder would have difficulty in getting, and a player new in major league company might be excused for missing them. Any one familiar with Lajoie's skill as a batter, can understand how it would be quite possible for him to make hits against a recruit, when he can turn the trick against the most experienced veterans of the game, time and again. I give Corriden a clean bill and do not think that any suspicion or blame should attach to him. I am very glad to find the facts as they are."

ALL STARS AND HIGHLANDERS

Washington, Oct. 14.—The All-Americans and Athletics gave a splendid exhibition of fast baseball today, the former winning by the score of 4 to 1. Walter Johnson was a puzzle to the champions, holding them to five scattered hits until the last inning, when he slackened his speed and two doubles resulted. New York, Oct. 14.—Victory perched on the banners of the New York American league club today when they passed the Nationals in the last innings of a well played contest and won the second game of the post season series by a score of 5 to 4. The game took place on the American league grounds and the stands were packed, but on the whole (the contest lacked the tang of yesterday's game, won by the Nationals at the polo grounds. This was due, perhaps, to reaction, now that the series is under way. It was a pitchers contest between the left-handed Wiltse of the Nationals and Warhop of the Americans and the honors were fairly even until the last two innings, when in the face of a batting rally, Wiltse weakened and lost control. Warhop worked splendidly throughout the game, and his effectiveness increased as the innings passed. After the third inning the Nationals made but one hit off him and his underhand ball came to the plate to break sharply before the Nationals' batsmen in a mystifying manner, causing them to send up weak flies. Devlin alone solved Warhop's delivery making a home and a double, which brought three of the Nationals across the plate. Fletcher, at short, did excellent work.
