GREEKS
SHUT OUT
BY BANGOR

The Marathons, who were leading the league, dropped with a thud on Saturday afternoon to Bangor, the favorites, who were not satisfied with a win but gained three scores and shut out the Greeks. There were two features in the game, viz., excellent playing on the part of the players and very poor umpiring by Umpire McCann. The latter, however, did not play any favorites as he was bad to both teams, who had many disputes with him over some of the decisions, and the fans also became sore and roared Mr. Ump's considerable. The weather looked very threatening during the early afternoon and it was a question for some time if it was fit to pull off a game of ball under the existing conditions. The infield was in good condition but it was quite wet in the outfield. Owing to the condition of the weather only about five hundred fans turned out to see the battle, and they saw a real good game of ball. Bangor was not as weak a team as they have been in the past, for their infield was greatly strengthened. In the box they had Rip McPhee from Eastport, Me., and he proved as steady as a church and pitched a good game of ball. He was caught by Mayo, another new man on the team, while still another new man was Lamoureux, who was on second. Captain Jackson was on the bench, where he directed the players. Shanley started in for the Marathons, but he could not get control of the ball and was very wild. It was only sharp work on the part of the Greeks that Bangor did not pile in a number of runs in the fourth inning instead of only one score. Shanley had no less than three wild pitches, gave three bases on balls and allowed two singles to be made off his delivery. Two runners were put out at the plate, however, and with the bases full, Doan flied out to center field and retired the side.

In the fifth inning, two singles and a sacrifice gave Bangor their second run. Shanley pitched the remainder of the game and warmed the bench while Dedrich took charge of the mound and finished the game, being much more steady than Shanley. With two men out in the seventh inning, Mayo hit to right and stole second and was then driven across the plate by a single to left made by Hammond. The next two batters got bases on balls and, with the bases full, Priestly went out, short to first, and retired the side.

It looked as if the Marathons were going to have a rally in the last inning, when a couple of the players made singles, but two men out on flies and the third hitting out to first finished the game.

Only two errors were made during the game. Tewhey juggled a ball at short in the eighth inning, while in the last O'Brien performed the same stunt for the Greeks.

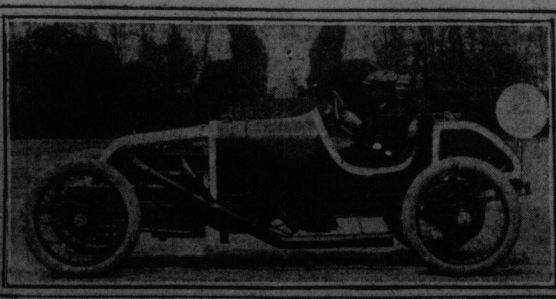

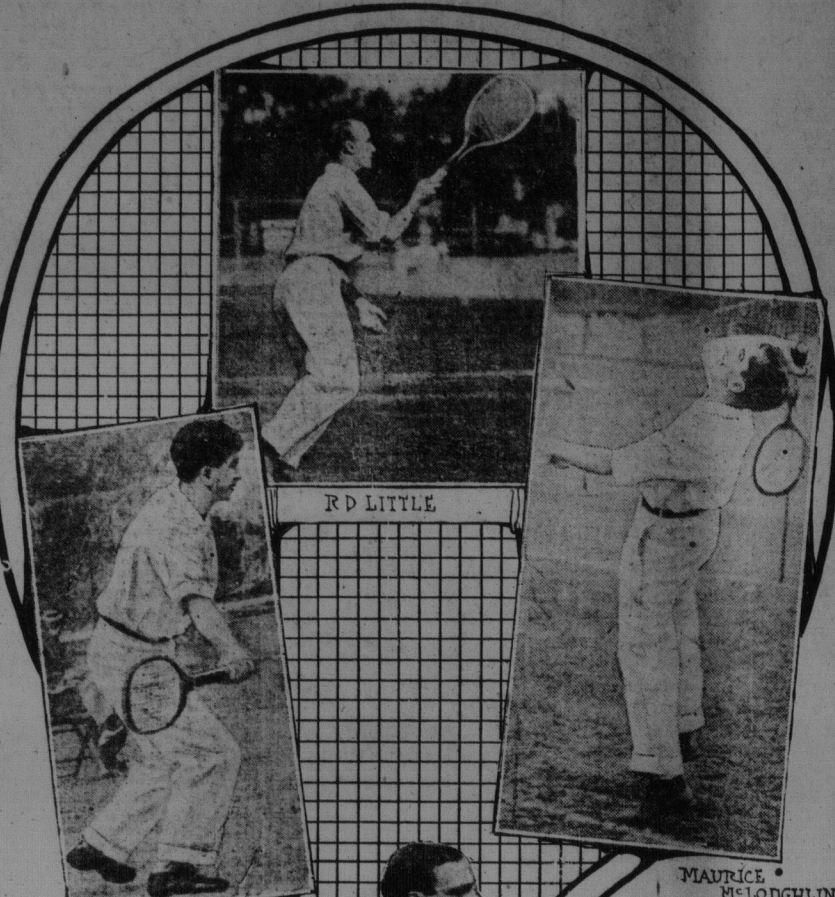
BURMAN IN FAST LAPS AT SPEEDWAY.

The community was shocked this morning to learn of the death of Dr. Ferdinand L. Pedelley, ex-Mayor. Dr. Pedelley was around as usual yesterday, rode several miles on his motor cycle last night and just before six o'clock when one of his daughters called him good night, just before she retired. He was then in his office, minding his eldest daughter, Miss Ada, found him dead in his office most. The Dr. Pedelley was summoned from the life extinct. Heart failure was the cause of death. Dr. Pedelley had always enjoyed good health, was a hard worker, and never, until a month ago even complained of feeling tired.

He would have been 64 years old next month. He was born in Fredericton. He practised first in Dalhousie.
