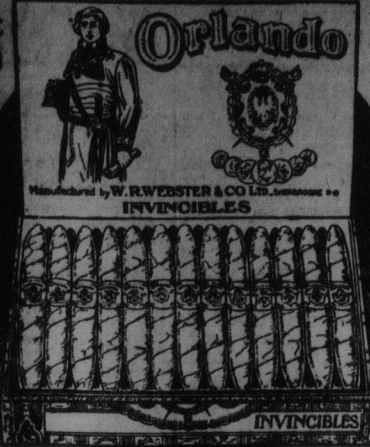

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

The sole head of a family, or any member 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be, a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years. In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead patent and cultivate 20 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.
A settler after obtaining homestead patent if he cannot secure a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.
When Dominion lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

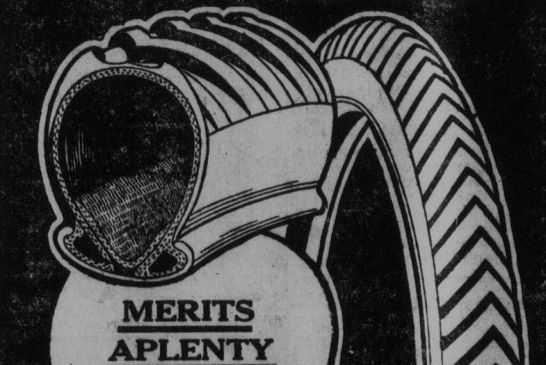

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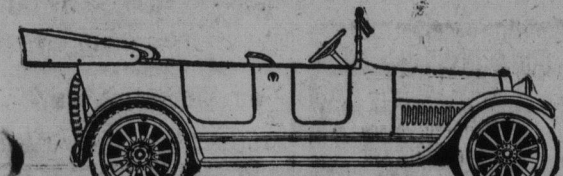
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
