

Some Canadian Political Topics

What Newspapers Have to Say About the Ontario Election—Results Offer No Encouragement to Liberals.

A Political Revolution.

The Hearst Government has been overthrown, but Ontario Liberalism cannot pin its faith on having brought about the overthrow. The verdict of the polls was almost as severe an arraignment of the Liberal party in Ontario as it was of the Conservative party. After fourteen years of opposition official Liberalism in Ontario has failed to impress the electors with its virtues or its ability. So far as official Conservatism is concerned, comment is unnecessary; the electors showed very emphatically what they thought of the Hearst Government.

So that it is a "new heaven and a new earth," politically speaking, that has been created in Ontario. When men like Sir William Hearst, Sir Adam Beck, W. D. McPherson, T. W. McCarthy, L. B. Lucas and P. D. Macdonald—the commander-in-chief of the party and his staff—have been swept out of political existence, and at the same time their political and social opponents got very little more consideration from the electors, it is not a mere political overturn that has happened, but political revolution, revolution by ballot, perhaps not less profound and far-reaching than revolution by bullet.

Little Hope for Liberals.

In one of the most remarkable elections Ontario has ever experienced the Hearst Government went down to defeat yesterday. Sir William Hearst and all but two members of those of his Cabinet, who were not elected by acclamation went under in the landslide, and of the strong following of 70 members who sat behind the Prime Minister in the last Legislature only some 26 members remain. The defeat of the Conservatives was due almost entirely to the tremendous vote rolled up by the United Farmers candidates and by the Labor men. The Liberals, despite their win of five seats in "Tory Toronto," stand in the new Legislature practically as they were in the last House. In fact, when all the returns are in Hartley Dewart, K. C., the Liberal leader, will probably have a smaller following than did Wm. Broadfoot the former leader.

Too Socialistic.

The Ontario general election yesterday resulted in such losses for the government that its pretension as an early date is to be looked for. This was not generally expected. The conditions, however, were unusual. Instead of two parties appealing for support, there were four. The Conservatives were really an advanced socialistic organization, under the dominance of Sir Adam Beck and two or three city newspapers, which roared rather than reasoned and made men of conservative instincts afraid of their platform. Against them were the Liberals, also Socialistic in their attitude; the Labor party, of advanced theorists; and the United Farmers, who, on the matter of spending money at least were advocates of a moderate policy. The multiplicity of appeals thus indicated made for uncertainty. Then, in the excitement of the war fever, votes had been given to women, which introduced another factor of unknown influence.

Another View.

(Toronto Mail and Empire.) The election, with all its singularities, is the consequence of unrest. The policy of the Government that received most attention in the contest was approved at the polls, but did not win the support of the people for the Government's candidates. A great part of those who voted to continue the Government's war time legislation in restraint of the liquor traffic voted against the candidates of the Government. Conservative legislators are used to that kind of treatment at the hands of temperance voters. Then the women, who owe the franchise they exercised in this election to the Hearst Government, in many cases voted only for the temperance legislation and omitted to vote for candidates, or preferred those who were opposed to the Government. In the popular brainstorm five Ministers were defeated. Sir Adam Beck went down to defeat. It remains to be seen whether or not the voters have brought legislation and government to a state of deadlock.

The Result in Ontario.

(Frederick Gleason.) The defeat of the Hearst Government was perhaps overdue. The unwarranted extension of the life of the last Assembly was made because of the fear that it was not then safe for the government to go to the people. Public confidence in the leaders of the dominant party in provincial Ontario has been on the wane since the death of Sir James Whitney removed the strong man from the helm. Sir James Whitney possessed a high sense of the responsibilities of constitutional government; he viewed all public questions from a broad standpoint; he was practical and progressive and at all times sincerely interested in the public welfare; he had no place for the cheap sentimentalism nor the professional politician who disregarded sound political principle. He was a safe man, and universally respected as such. Sir William Hearst was a mere temporizer, and under his administration as such conditions were created which became repugnant to thoughtful Ontario, and which soon led to lack of public respect for government as he influenced it.

TO COMMEMORATE—New York, Oct. 23.—Former President Taft today sent an appeal to the clergy throughout the country to hold exercises in churches and schools to commemorate the birthday of Theodore Roosevelt which occurs next Monday. It was announced here by the Roosevelt Memorial Association, Mr. Taft, who is honorary president of the association, urged that such exercises be held on Sunday and Monday. A number of ministers have chosen as the text for their memorial sermons the verse from the bible quoted by Col. Roosevelt in his message written for the New York Bible Society,

and placed in pocket Testaments given to soldiers in the world war. The quotation was the following from the Prophet Micah:

What more doth the Lord require of thee than to do justice and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God.

Credit Granting Organization To Be Formed

Their Purpose Will be to Purchase Securities of Struggling Foreign Nations.

Atlantic City, N. J., Oct. 23.—Formation in this country of a credit granting organization to purchase securities of struggling foreign nations was urged at the international trade conference today by United States Secretary of Commerce Redfield. The organization which would be supervised by the federal reserve board would

be capitalized at between \$500,000,000 and \$1,000,000,000 and would issue bonds of small denomination and low interest to be sold here. The secretary said that several billion dollars would be needed by struggling nations in the next few years to place themselves on a firm footing. "I hope and believe," he added, "that we shall open our doors much more freely than we do now to receive goods from abroad. We cannot get it if we do not buy. We cannot get along by selling goods and asking cash in return. I hope that the time will come when the biggest men of this country will get so much vision that the system of selling goods abroad and demanding cash will not be respected."

SIX MILLION TONS OF AMERICAN COAL WILL GO TO EUROPE

London, Oct. 23.—A despatch to the Evening News from Cardiff says that W. H. Gardner, a Swansea coal operator, on Wednesday in Paris completed an arrangement under which six million tons of gas, steam and ordinary coal are to be shipped from America to continental ports.
