Complete Account of N. Y. State Races

Moore Cut in While Having Yard to Spare and Lost Championship to Charles Jewtraw.

The following account of the races at Binghamton, N. Y., on Sunday last is taken from the New York Herald: Binghamton, N. Y., Jan. 8.—Charles Jewtraw, the Lake Placid ice skating champion, was this title by defeating a field of thirty skaters, including Joe Moore, international champion, and a galaxy of speed and distant skaters on the Ideal Park rink at Binghamton this afternoon. Jewtraw scored 90 points, Moore 89 points and Paul Forman 87 points.

Joe Moore lost a title he coveted greatly by an alleged foul committed against Paul Forman in the 230 yard final, when he cut in front of the "Tremont" rink skater. Moore was one yard ahead of him at the time, and therefore brought a disqualification upon himself when victory was in sight. He finished a yard ahead of Forman, with Jewtraw five yards ahead of the field. Ed Moore retained second place but would have won the title by points. Even had he been placed he would have tied Jewtraw for the title.

Jewtraw was the first in the 230, 440 and half mile events, while Moore won the one and three mile events and was second in the half mile. Moore's failure to get a place in the 230, due to the disqualification, cost him the championship or even at the worst a tie for the championship.

Speed Versus Endurance.—The most fully illustrated of the sporting qualities of Jewtraw and the endurance ability of Moore. Jewtraw failed to finish in the three mile or five mile event, while Moore was easily outdistanced in the 440 yard event. The closest and most exciting race of the afternoon was the half mile event, in which Jewtraw nosed out the international champion by a margin of ten minutes to describe. Six starters responded to Harry Noah's gun.

Moore and Jewtraw trailed the field for the first two laps, but Moore lay back in fifth position and Jewtraw followed him closely. They kept these positions until two laps were left to skate, when both started to sprint. Jewtraw brought them 400 yards from the tape on even terms. The spectators were in a frenzy, cheering as the two champions came down the homestretch. Jewtraw every effort to nose out his rival, Jewtraw came through with a dash five yards from the line that gave him a victory by inches. Both skaters headed overlapping Jewtraw's speeding front.

It was a spectacular finish of the most exciting race of the afternoon. More than 5,000 persons lined the rink and filled the grand stand for the event.

Renowned Skaters Entered In Races

The Fastest Amateurs in Canada and United States Will Compete Here in Canadian Championships.

Now that the entries of Roe McWhorter and William Steinhilber, of Chicago, and West Becker, of New York, have been received, the Y. M. C. I. have completed the booking of the leading amateur skating stars of the United States and Canada for the Canadian Amateur Outdoor Skating Championships, which are to be held under their auspices on Lily Lake, Jan. 18 and 19.

St. John will surely look big on the sporting map of the entire continent on those two days, for in Jewtraw, Moore, McWhorter, Gorman and the other stellar speed skaters is comprised a galaxy of the skaters of the age.

McWhorter, the last big man to enter with Jewtraw, the two great skaters with whom Charles Gorman, our own local star, had to compete at the international meet last year.

The receipt of both McWhorter and Gorman's entries were announced yesterday. Gorman and Edith Belyea and possibly Freddie Logan, along with Gorman, should prove a strong team to upstage the city's reputation as a speed skating centre.

In the international meet last year, McWhorter captured the mile event in 2:03 3/4, with Gorman taking second place. The two rivals finished the half mile in the same order, in 1:23 3/4.

Jewtraw led in the two mile, with McWhorter second and Gorman third. The total scoring for points was in the same order as the two mile event.—Jewtraw first, with 120 points; McWhorter second, with 90 points; and Gorman third, with 80 points.

The local fans are hoping that Charles will reverse the order in the coming meet, and in view of the hard training he has gone through in making himself fit for the 18th and 19th, feel confident that he will add to the fame he already has won as an amateur 440 yard champion of the world.

Other local entries received include Rodie Burton for the senior event; Roy Lawson and Edith Dalton for the 18 and under class, and Willie Logan, son of former Amateur Champion Fred Logan, for the 15 and under class.

The N. B. Boxing Championships

Sanction Given Carleton Rowing Club—St. Mary's Gets N. S. Event, and St. John Garrison the Maritime.

The 62nd New Brunswick Boxing Championships, and in all probability the Maritime Boxing Championships, will be held in St. John this winter. The Carleton Rowing Club has been awarded the provincial championships and the St. Mary's Rowing Club the Nova Scotia Championships by A. W. Covey president of the M. P. branch of the A. A. U. of C.

Mr. Covey announced yesterday that an application had been made by the St. John Garrison Sports and Entertainment Association for the Maritime championships, and that they would likely be awarded to them.

New York, Jan. 10.—Harry Frasse, president of the Boston American League baseball club tonight announced completion of a three-cornered deal, by which Roger Peckinpough, former Yankee shortstop goes to the Washington Club as playing manager and Joe Dugan, Athletics' third baseman, is transferred to the Boston team.

Peckinpough, who was captain of the Yankee team last season, was traded to Boston last month with Pitchers Rip Collins, Jack Quinn and Bill Piercy in exchange for Everett Scott, Red Sox shortstop and Piveter Joe Bush and Sam Jones.

In addition to Dugan, the Boston club receive Shortstop Frank O'Rourke of the Washington Club, Philadelphia gets Outfielder Ed Miller and Pitcher Acosta of the Washington Club in exchange for Dugan.

So far as the Boston Club is concerned, Frasse said, no money consideration was involved in the trade. An official of the Yankee Club stated tonight that the New York Americans tried to obtain Dugan by purchase some time ago and offered \$400,000, which was refused last month.

New York, Jan. 10.—With the restoration of amicable relations between the leading managers of boxers and Ted Rickard patrons of the ring sport are assured of splendid sport before the present indoor season closes. There is hardly a doubt that nearly every champion in America, with the single exception of Kilbane, will appear in the Garden in defense of his title. Jack Britton, the water champion, is already matched with Dave Shade, a worthy opponent and will appear Jan. 31.

Battling Lavinsky, light heavyweight champion, will defend his honors against Gene Tunney next Friday night, which should be an excellent contest.

Negotiations are now under way as a result of which Benny Leonard will risk the world's lightweight championship and will meet the best man available, Rocky Kansas, Charley White and Lew Treadler are among the leading contenders.

It is hinted that Johnny Wilson now regrets his action in cancelling his match with Harry Greb and will go through with the bout.

Fulton May Get Another Chance. If Fred Fulton convinces Rickard that he is in good fighting condition the plasterer may get a match with Deppsey later on. Buff is to sail for England next Monday, but has promised to box for Rickard as soon as he returns.

Kilbane will be the hardest man to draw into the ring at the Garden, but the resourceful Rickard may accomplish that task. If he succeeds he will establish the unparalleled record of staging bouts inside of a year in which five world's champions and two American title holders defend their honors.

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Grand Circuit Adopt Schedule

Cleveland, Jan. 10.—The stewards of the grand circuit today adopted a schedule for 1922 harness horse racing, opening the season at North Randall track, Cleveland, the week of July 8, and closing at Atlanta, Ga., the week of October 16. The application of the Keelworth Park, Windsor, Ont., for a date was not granted. Other grand circuit days were awarded the same as last year.

The schedule follows: Week of July 3, North Randall; July 10, Toledo; July 17, Kalamazoo; July 24, Columbus; July 31, Toledo; August 7, North Randall; August 14, Philadelphia; Aug. 21, Poughkeepsie; August 28, Reading; September 4, Hartford; September 11, Syracuse; September 18 and 25, Texas; October 2 and 9, Lexington, Ky., and October 16, Atlanta.

The stewards appointed Secretary Harry Sheppard of Columbus, O., a committee of one to present to the joint rules committee of the American and National Trotting Association and also to the rules committee of the Union Trotting Association the following recommendations regarding heat races to take immediate effect: In all races conducted under the three heat plan, any horse winning a heat shall like a win-race record.

All racing should be conducted under the two in three system, except handicaps or dashes. On scoring violation the stewards recommended the following to be made: A rule to be made whereby consent or by consent of the presiding judge may punish unruly drivers in scoring by substituting a driver for that race on day or fine, or suspension from one to seven days or by disqualifying horse and refunding entrance fees.

Regarding three in five heat racing the stewards made the following recommendations to the rules committee: In all races under the three-in-five heat plan races at the conclusion of the fifth heat and at the conclusion of the sixth heat, this rule to be optional with members who have been in the three-in-five heat plan.
