## HAY PRICES TAKE JUMP

Timothy Hay Now Selling at \$24 per Ton—No Straw Offered.

Although Tuesday is generally a large market day, only about 10 loads of hay and a load of oats were offered. The demand for hay was active, and the top price jumped to \$24 per ton, but the minimum remained at \$22. Only one load of clover hay was sold, and it brought \$23 per ton.

No straw has been offered for about a week, and the demand has become so good that prices are expected to soar before the end of the week.

Although there was only one load of oats sold today, the demand was active and prices were unchanged. Market officials are of the opinion that oats are due to take a slump before the end of the week.
