DISTRICT AND GENERAL

Rural mail contractors demand a new system and more remuneration. A large black bear is said to have made its appearance in the Government park at Rondeau.

H. A. Gilroy of Alvington threshed over 10 bushels of wheat from 55 acres sown—a return of nearly 30 bushels per acre.

Photographs and written documents in facsimile have been transmitted across the ocean for the first time by wireless.

The price of milk in Tilsonburg has been advanced to 16c per quart. The price in St. Thomas has been 12c for some time.

While rolling down a bank in a Dundee park, a 10-year-old boy named George Clark was killed through a safety-pin that held his necktie, piercing his body near the heart.

Lade fascinated by the idea of banditry should ask themselves, in the light of the tragic end of Holburn and McFadden, if that is the sort of death they would wish to die.

An Iowa lawyer has recorded his will on a phonograph cylinder instead of on paper. The names of the witnesses were recorded also, and the cylinder sealed in a box and filed.

Owing to lack of orders, the Massey-Harris Company have closed down their plant at Toronto. On account of the low price of farm produce, farmers are not buying any machinery beyond their actual needs.

The oldest resident of Kent county, a colored woman named Martha Watson, has just celebrated her 107th birthday. She was born in Virginia and for seventeen years has been an inmate of the Home for the Friendless.

Herbert Greenfield, Alberta's premier designate, will be in St. Catharines shortly. The U.F.O. of West Middlesex will tender a reception to the Western premier during his visit and arrangements to that end are now going forward.

The popular Prince of Wales may be in Canada again in May of next year. His royal highness' tour of India will conclude at Karachi on March 17, 1922, when the Prince and his party will return home via Japan, and probably visit Canada.

Watford will vote on a by-law on August 22 to raise funds for the paving of the main street, which is a connecting link to a provincial trunk road. Approximately \$7,000 has been subscribed by local citizens for the building of a new skating rink.

Loss to the extent of about \$15,000 was caused by a fire which broke out in the large plant and warehouse of the Sutherland-Fines Company at Chatham. The plant was completely destroyed, along with a large stock of staves which were stored in the building.

Roy Holburn and William McFadden were executed Wednesday morning at Toronto for the murder of L. C. Sabine, Toronto druggist, executive clemency having been denied them. The condemned men were hanged upon the same scaffold at the same time, facing each other.

One of the season's worst fires occurred at the farm of W. A. Glover, Fingal, on Saturday, when lightning struck the large modern barn on the farm, the resulting fire destroying it, together with the season's crop of grain, between 20 and 30 tons of hay and the threshing machine which was in the barn at the time.

The economic situation in Russia forebodes a death rate during the coming winter that "will stagger the world," according to information received by U.S. Secretary of Commerce Hoover. General stagnation of agricultural and industrial activities have resulted in conditions appalling to officials of relief organizations who have acquainted themselves with the situation.

An interesting decision has been given by Judge Elliott in the case of Skelton vs. Esquering. Township which was tried in the county court at Milton on July 23rd. The plaintiff claimed damages from the defendant for the cutting of trees on the highway opposite his property without giving the legal ten days' notice. Judge Elliott awarded the plaintiff \$75 damages, he to pay his own costs in connection with the lawsuit.

Detroit motorists strongly approve of the new law providing a certificate of title for motor vehicles. Application blanks for certificates are now being mailed to Detroit from Lansing and it is expected that many owners will have them by October. The law is seen as an effective protective measure against the purchase and sale of stolen cars, as it will be impossible to sell a car unless there is a clear title to it as in the case of a piece of land.

The West will probably produce this season a grain crop which will be as good as the average, or perhaps better, according to the forecast of the Canadian Pacific Railway crop report issued Tuesday. On the whole, it is stated, crops are better in the southern parts of the province than in the northern districts.

The last week has been somewhat more favorable from the weather standpoint, with rains more general. Hail has destroyed many good crops, yet on the whole the damage from this source is said to have been not abnormal. Red and black rust are reported in many localities, but the damage is not extensive.

TO OPEN DUTTON PARK

Dutton, Aug. 8.—It is definitely decided to have the new Memorial Athletic Park officially opened on Tuesday, August 16, which function will be performed by Hon. F. C. Biggs, minister of public works.

Caledonian games will take place on the same day, and the Kintyre Camp, Sons of Scotland, which has been largely instrumental in putting the park in shape, will arrange a fascinating program.

TO CURB POWER OF J. P.'s

The powers of justices of the peace will shortly be curtailed, it is learned. The attorney-general's department is taking steps to readjust the jurisdiction of county magistrates. The change is to be general and several justices of the peace in Middlesex will be affected by the change.

At the present time a justice of the peace has in considerable part the powers of a police magistrate. Under the readjustment the powers will be limited so that they will be able to take informations and try cases under municipal by-laws only. They will not have the power to deal with any case coming under the statutes or the criminal code.

Magistrates will be appointed in each county who will have jurisdiction over the powers of police magistrates. In the majority of counties it is likely that there will be only one magistrate, but in some of the larger and more thickly populated counties two magistrates will probably be appointed. It is possible that Middlesex, being one of the larger counties, will have two magistrates.

Under the readjustment justices of the peace will not have the power to try actions under the Motor Vehicles Act, although which there has been a great deal of complaint, not only in Middlesex county, but throughout the province. Motorists claim that the county constables, paid by fee, are too zealous in their chase of motorists on county roads.

It is possible that there will be a change in the county constable's salary at the present time, also. Several constables at a permanent salary will probably replace the forces at present paid by fee.

GRAHAM CLAN MEETING

London, Aug. 5.—A meeting and social gathering of the Graham clan was held at Springbank Park on Saturday, July 23. There was a very large attendance from the different sections, viz.: Caradoc, Dunwich and Lobo.

The idea of the meeting was to complete all financial transactions, etc., occurring during the Graham clan picnic.

John McVicar was appointed to take charge of the meeting. It was regularly moved and seconded that the picnic be held annually at Springbank Park on the third Thursday of June, each section taking charge of the picnic each year, viz.: Dunwich, Lucknow, Glencoe, Detroit and London. Dunwich was appointed to take charge of the gathering to be held in 1922.

After some discussion re arranging for the annual picnic, it was moved by Neil Blue, seconded by John Graham that the meeting nominate a committee of two out of each section. The following committees were appointed:—Lobo, John McVicar; Caradoc, John A. McGugan; Dunwich, Duncan Lodge and Arthur Graham; Glencoe, John C. Graham; London, Archie McLachlan and Norman Graham.

Regularly moved and seconded that D. A. Graham be elected honorary president of the Graham clan. John Graham gave a very interesting and complete financial report.

Presentation was made to D. A. Graham, chairman, and Miss Beckie McLachlan. A nice reply was made in both cases.

After several members spoke, and a very good luncheon enjoyed, the meeting adjourned.

ALDBOROUGH BARNS BURNED

Rodney, Aug. 9.—During the electric storm on Saturday afternoon Michael Hogan, who resides on Back street, had his barn with contents completely destroyed by fire.

On Saturday evening George Johnston's barn was totally destroyed by fire, including the fall's crops, machinery and bugies, which were partly covered by insurance. The cause of the fire was thought to be spontaneous combustion.

DRURY COMING TO GLENCOE

Hon. E. C. Drury, Premier of Ontario, and Andrew Hicks, Government whip, are coming to Glencoe on August 24th to address the people at the big Middlesex U.F.O. picnic to be held in the Weekes grove. Local members of the Legislature will also be present and speak. Full arrangements for the event have not yet been completed, but there will be a splendid program of music by the 15th Regimental Band of Strathroy and quartettes and solos by some of the most popular artists. A program of sports and games is also being prepared. In all, the picnic promises to be one of the most outstanding events of the season and an exceptionally large attendance is expected.

BACK TO THE FARMS

Toronto, Aug. 8.—Never before have there been so many "out-of-workers" sent from the city to the farms as this season. The Ontario Government Employment Bureau states that 4,000 men have been sent to the farms in the last five months. Among these were 800 married couples. This means that 800 families left the city to live in the country and was a considerable help towards relieving the unemployment situation. Though there are, of course, a number of men who "kick," the bureau announces that this year there have been a surprisingly small number of refusals. According to Captain Meach, who is in charge of the bureau, there has been a great demand for experienced help. Many men would have gone on the farms, but unfortunately had no experience with horses, milking or similar work and so were unable to go. In many cases the farmers were afraid to take a chance, but in a number of cases farmers have taken men who were quite inexperienced.

CALLED THEIR BLUFF

In Simcoe they have had some trouble with their high school teachers on the score of impudent demands for salary. The hard-headed men and the teachers' guild kicked up its heels and tried to make it impossible for the board to get a full staff for next term. But the board succeeded and every town in Ontario is delighted. These little uprisings of the school board may cost the taxpayers something at first, but they will bring ultimate relief.—Port Rowan News.
