
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Memo to Prime Minister's Office.

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Over the week-end, Berlin short wave made a number of references to ^Canada. Special talks to French-speaking ^Canada were continued from D.J.D. (Berlin) at 6.30 P.M. Sunday, March 3, 1940. A further talk in French for French-speaking ^Canadians was announced for the same hour next Sunday.

Saturday, March 2, 1940

In dialogue between "Jimmy and Jognny", remark made that Canadian& should stay at home and not go to Europe to fight for France. In last war, Germany not defeated in the field but by hunger at home. Germany would not make the same mistake again. North, east and south, Germany was trading as though there were no war. It was now England's turn to feel something like starvation. Already there was something like panic over the loss of food ships.

In Canada, there was no panic yet, but there were disputes, unrest, dissatisfaction; and this was the case, too, in India, Australia, South Africa, everywhere in the British Empire. It was a dissatisfaction, which despite victorious armies, might well bring the British Empire down. That was why Britain was appealing to neutrals for help.

Sunday, March 3. (Special talk to French-speaking Canada in French)

Large part of talk devoted to rebuttal of charges of Germany atrocities in Poland.
