Dear Mr. Mackenzie King:

Allow me to congratulate your Excellency most heartily for the civic courage which you showed disclosing under the pretext of a vulgar and alas, very ordinary military attache, spying affair, the most dangerous hidden preparation of a world political cataclysm, the centre of which is presently in Moscow, hiding itself behind Russian Imperial Nationalism, the geopolitical aims of which are partly legitimate, but were always during the existence of the Russian Empire, christian in its bottom and essence, considered and fought for by Russian historical traditions, obvious economic and strategic interests and the man's in the street psychology, an object to be attained not by a general upheaval but by treaties, like those which the government, under Nicolas II has signed in the Far-East, or in 1915 with Great Britain for the straits solution.

As Canadian public opinion rightly grasped in the spy affair the important point is not in an atom-bomb secret, as a matter of fact and most happily not stolen at all, but in the systematic corruption psychologically even more pernicious that the money one that a great state is cynically practising, pretending in the same time, as we saw it with an incomparable disgust at the London conference of the O.N.U. during May to give public lessons of international morality, and to whom? to the most nobly idealistic states of the present time, Great Britain, having risked her life in order to save a principle, having heroically ruined herself for the trijmph of the principle of self-destruction and spending all her efforts not so much for her own benefit, but for a new equilibrium, impossible to be attained with such partners as U.R.S.S.

And that is the point for which I do work increasingly writing and encouraged by the answers of some of the most influential world statesmen.
