- Only a part of it I believe.
- The map shows Lot 253 and it also shows an arrow pointing to 254, and Lot 24 is the 40-acre block?
- A No; that is 320 acres minus what has been taken up by the river.
- MR COMMISSIONER MACDOWALL: Why was it that Hammer sold to Brynildsen instead of having Crown-granted it over to Capoose?
- I don't know. Lot 24 was purchased by Brynildsen and the understanding was that Brynildsen was to purchase this direct from the Government for Capoose with Capoose's consent.
- MR COMMISSIONER SHAW: What was the understanding between Capcose and Brynildsen in regard to Lot 24? Brynildsen states that the agreement was that this land should be turned over to Capcose when everything was settled including his account at the store—what is Capcose's statement in regard to this?
- A "His statement is not very clear. His statement is that the agreement was made with in Brynildsen at Bella Coola in Jacobsen's house in the presence of Mr Carlson, Surveyor Green, and a third party. Now Brynildsen says he never made this arrangement at the time and place; he says there was a written agreement that Mr Brynildsen should purchase this land for him that is Lot 24; Capoese cannot distinguish between these two places to him they are all as one.
- Q. Have you seen this written agreement?
- A No I have never seen it and Mr Brynildsen says there was no written agreement made, but he said I got it for Capoese.

THE CHAIRMAN: Is not the dispute about the store-bill?

- A Yes, I think so.
- MR COMMISSIONER SHAW: Do you know whether this agreement was ever made between Brynildsen and Capoose?
- A I could not say,
- Do you know whether at the time that Brynildsen and Capoose made this agreement whether Capoose owed Brynildsen a store account them?
- A Yes, I think he did,
