OFFER ACCEPTED WITH THANKS

Canada will Contribute Another Mounted Force to South Africa.

Message From Chamberlain Expressing Imperial Government's Gratitude.

Ottawa, Nov. 26.—The following cablegram was received by His Excellency the Governor-General today:—

"Lord Minto, Ottawa.—Referring to your telegram of November 21, Imperial Government gratefully accepts the offer of a corps, consisting of not less than 600 men, to be raised on the following lines:—

"First—Men to be able to ride and shoot.

"Secondly—Imperial Yeomanry rate of pay to be accepted, namely, cavalry rates to date of embarkation, and Yeomanry rates subsequently.

"Thirdly—Canadian Government to provide horses, saddlery, uniforms, boots, etc., on payment. The Imperial Government to provide arms.

"Fourthly—Officers to be nominated by Canadian Government, and their names submitted to commander-in-chief for approval of the Secretary of State for War.

"Fifthly—Medical conditions to be as for Imperial Yeomanry.

"Sixthly—Preference to be given to men who have had previous service in South Africa, and to single men. Married men and widowers with children to be accepted provided that they understand that no separation allowance will be issued.

"Telegraph as soon as possible whether scheme as outlined above meets with approval of your Ministers. (Signed) Chamberlain."

THE SCHEME SATISFACTORY.

Ottawa, Nov. 26.—The scheme outlined by Mr. Chamberlain in his despatch to the Canadian Government regarding the mounted corps, has been found satisfactory to the Canadian Government and a reply has been sent the Colonial Secretary to this effect.

In the meantime, Col. T. B. Evans has been telegraphed to at Winnipeg to come on at once to Ottawa, presumably to consult with the Minister of Militia respecting the selection of his officers, the work of recruiting, outfitting, mobilization and so forth.

The Militia Department would be glad to have it generally known that it is useless for applications to serve in the regiment to be sent to the department. All applicants should address to the district officer commanding the district to which they belong, and thus save time. Numerous applications are coming in by every mail, and nothing can be done with them at the department, except to refer them to the proper quarters, and it has been found necessary in view of the heavy correspondence to confine replies merely to acknowledgments of letters received, and this only in the case of officers.

PARIS TRAGEDY

Wronged Husband Shoots His Faithless Wife and her Lover in a Public Street.

Paris, Nov. 26.—A tragedy characteristically Parisian was committed in the heart of Paris today. At the corner of the Boulevard des Capucines and the Place de l'Opera a husband shot his faithless wife and her lover in full view of hundreds of people. The opera square was filled with promenaders at lunch time when a cab drove across the square, followed by a man running. A policeman, who was regulating traffic, stopped the cab in front of the cafe de la Paix, enabling the pursuer to overtake it, when the man drew a revolver, thrust it through a window of the vehicle and fired twice, killing the woman, who was inside. Her lover opened the other door and tried to flee, but the husband sprang after him and blew out his brains before anyone could interfere. Then the husband approached the policeman, handed him the weapon and surrendered.

A robber shot and killed J. Asling, Man.

A freight wreck on the C. P. R. near Cross Lake delayed traffic about eight hours.

It is reported that the switchmen's strike ordered at Pittsburgh yesterday is a flat failure.

Arch. McDonald was struck by a locomotive at Sault Ste. Marie and probably fatally injured.

George James was run over while trying to cross under a train at Stratford. His leg was cut off.

ALLEGED PLOT IN THE YUKON

That Serious Trouble out there is Imminent Canadian Officials Admit.

Three of Them on Their Way to Ottawa for help to put down the Threatened Rebellion.

Chicago, Nov. 26.—Overland through Alaska to the sea, by water to Seattle, and through the United States on their way to Ottawa, officials of the Yukon are hurrying to plead at the Canadian capital for help to put down the rebellion threatened by members of the Order of the Midnight Sun.

Three of these officials have arrived at Chicago, and others are on the way. That serious trouble is imminent in the far north-west is candidly admitted by three members of the Yukon Department of Public Works who are in consultation at the Palmer House with local capitalists who have interests in that country. The men are D. McR. Minard, accountant; J. C. Tache, resident engineer, and P. E. Mercier, assistant engineer. President H. S. Graves, of the White Pass & Yukon Railroad Company, was among those who linked over the situation with the Yukon officials. The White Pass & Yukon Railway is owned largely by American capital, its main office being in Chicago. A determined, united effort by a band of at least 1,500 men, who have been laying plans for nearly a year, is the plot as described by the officials, to establish an independent government. Seven of the men are Americans, and they have grievances, and the ability to set them forth in convincing style. They believe they have power to secure by force the rights which they declare have been denied them. Governor-General Minto of Canada is to be asked to send troops to the scene, and at least to double the Mounted Police.

Mr. Minard, the leader of the party of officials, said: "We expect to proceed to Ottawa at once, and will have a consultation with the Government authorities about conditions in the Territory. This trouble may assume an international phase, because so many members of the secret military order are Americans, and we cannot try them for treason. The Mounted Police have always been competent heretofore to take care of all disorderly characters in the Territory, but this affair is of too serious a nature to be handled by police. Arms and ammunition, we are told, have been secreted in great quantities. Provisions have been cached at various strategic points this side of White Horse, which is the railway terminus, and beyond. Dawson was to be the capital of the republic. The conspirators depended on aid from Americans throughout Alaska, and circulated copies of grievances, with the grand seal of the organization, in White Horse, Dawson, Skagway, Hootalinqua and Circle City. Skagway is in American territory."

Kingston Council has adopted a by-law authorizing the use of voting machines at the coming municipal elections.

A special train carrying 250 artillerymen and 25 Royal Engineers, bound for Esquimaux, where they will do garrison duty, passed North Bay on the C. P. R. yesterday.

DOING MUCH GOOD WORK

Annual Meeting of the Kent Children's Aid Society.

D. S. Paterson Chosen President—Services of Dr. Bray Satisfactorily Acknowledged.

The annual meeting of the Kent Children's Aid Society was held last evening in the Sunday school room of Christ Church, with Hugh Macaulay in the presidential chair, in place of Rev. Mr. Sims, who has left the city. After the opening prayer by Rev. Rural Dean McCosh, chairman Macaulay gave an address. Misses McLean and Taylor gave one of their excellent instrumental duets.

The report of the Executive Officer was then read. It was as follows:—

Chatham, Nov. 26, 1901.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen: I beg to submit for your consideration my report as executive officer of the Kent Children's Aid Society for the year ending Dec. 31st, 1901, an

easy to say that the amount of work done was not as great as last year, and still I am glad, because I believe the influence of the society has had a tendency to make people feel that if they do not deal kindly with their children, they will be taken from them, and they themselves perhaps punished, as the law allows and directs. I have tried to investigate all the matters brought to my notice, and trusts that the action taken, and the advice given, will alike prove to have been in the best interests of the children, and the work expected of the society.

LETTERS.

During the year I have written 131 letters in connection with the work, asking assistance in placing children, replying to enquiries for children, collecting evidence on which to act in taking children before the judge, tracing children who have run away, etc.

I advocated last year a system of monthly reports, from society to society, but the scheme was never put in operation. I think, however, that the time will come when such a system will be adopted.

VISITS.

In connection with the work I have made 75 visits investigating complaints, securing evidence, consulting the solicitor, appearing before the judge, tracing runaway children, etc. Many miles have been travelled and a large amount of time consumed in this branch of the work.

JUVENILE OFFENDERS.

During the year there were in the police court, 21 boys—charged with stealing, disturbing private citizens, ill-treating smaller boys than themselves, etc. Of the 21 seven were fined, four were dismissed with a warning, seven are out on suspended sentence, two were given a short sentence of eight hours in the cells, and one was sent to the reformatory. In some of these cases the assistance of the Executive Officer was proffered, but refused; while in others the boys were grateful for the assistance given. I generally had a quiet talk with the offenders, pointing out to them the disgrace they were bringing upon themselves and their relatives, and trying to show them how to live right Christian lives.

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ANOMALY OF A MOURNFUL TYPE

Laurier's Hob-nobbing With Redmond Party Puzzles London Journals.

Cannot Understand Statesmen Sitting with Men Who Prayed for Success of Boers.

London, Nov. 26.—Commenting on the despatch, which appeared in several London papers recently, to the effect that the Canadian Premier and other public men had been present at a luncheon given to John Redmond and his co-Nationalists by the Irish societies of Ottawa, the Globe to-day says: "It is with great regret that we read of the presence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and two of his colleagues at a luncheon given to the Irish delegates in Ottawa. The appearance at the same table of the patriot statesman who organized successive contingents of loyal Canadians for active service in South Africa with an Irishman who has publicly prayed that heaven might bring success to the Boers, is an anomaly of a mournful type. The blood of these Canadians who fell at Paardeberg and on fifty other stricken fields cries out against such a meeting, and if it be true that the vice-regal comptroller of the household, and Earl Minto's aide-de-camp were present at a subsequent demonstration, official notice must be taken of it."

The St. James' Gazette says: "We should have thought John Redmond's attitude on the war would have saved us from such an extraordinary spectacle, but whatever Canadian ministers might do, it is absolutely unintelligible that officials of the government's household should be allowed to associate themselves with the open enemies of England."
