# BORIS SARAFOFF

Sketch of Young Leader of Macedonian Revolutionary Movement. Possessed by an hereditary hatred of the Turks, which has been inflamed by the arrest, imprisonment and ban-ishment of his father and grand-father for alleged revolutionary ac-tions. Boris Sarafoff, the young leader of the Macedonian revolution-

leader of the Macedonian revolutionary movement, is a personality of interest at this time, when the eruption of volcanic matter from the crater of the Balkans is a little more menacing than usual. He was born in the Turkish village of Ljubjachovo, the home of his ancestors for more than 200 years. He succeeded in entering the military academy at Sofia at the age of eighteen, and, passing his examinations with honor, he received a commission as Lieutenant of the 1st Buigarian Infantry Regiment at the age of twenty. For three years, until

sion as Lieutenant of the 1st Bugarian Infantry Regiment at the age of twenty. For three years, until 1895, when the Macedonian question began to attract the attention of the world, he retained his commission. Then he became restless, and resigned, to take part in the Macedonian movement. Gathering about him a hundred men of his own age, he began to drill them. On July 1 he crossed the frontier with eighty men on his way to Melnik. He and his followers slaughtered half of the garrison of one hundred men. Making a fiery speech to the inhabitants assembled in the market place, he announced a new movement against Turkey. The entire Christian population accompanied him to the local Greek church to give thanks for his success, Sarafoff and his following were obliged to retreat soon from Melnik, for a large body of Turkish troops was on its way toward the place. troops was on its way toward the place. His knowledge of the coun-try enabled him to escape. Sarafos continued his raids over the frontier. capturing garrisons, stirring up the

people, and escaping before an effective pursuit could be organized. The Turkish Government set a price of 100,000 francs on his head. He organized the Macedonian committee which is so well known, with many local committees, and an executive headquarters at Sofia. At the age of thirty Sarafoff's ambition is to organize a great rebellion, seize Con-stantinople, and, after dethroning the Sultan, establish a new Macedon-ian State, with himself at its head

Two years ago Turnbridge Wells and Glasgow were pointed to as bright examples in Municipal Ownership of telephone service. A few months ago the former abandoned the attempt at giving a satisfactory telephone service and sold their plant to the National Company. Now reports are coming to hand of unsatisfactory results in Glasgow. "The Bailie," a journal published in Glasgow in its issue of September 9th, says:

The position of the Glasgow Corporation Telephone Department as disclosed by the published accounts for the past financial year, is proving a source of uneusiness to those ratepayers with a sound knowledge of finance. Nor have their fears been alleviated by the auditors' remarks, who, in issuing their report make it perfectly plain that things are not as they ought to be. They point out that no depreciation has yet been provided for, nor has any sum standing at the debit of preliminary and general expenses in capital account been written off out of revenue. In the matter of sinking fund adequate provision has not been made, although, according to the auditors, the requirements of the Act of Parliament have apparently been complied with. Up till now certain management expenses, amounting in the aggregate to no small sum, have not agement expenses, amounting in the aggregate to no small sum, have not formed a charge against revenue.
