SERPAINS SWEEP AUSTRIANS OUT

Enormous Captures of Men, Guns and Material Made.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] LONDON, Dec. 14.-According to a Nish, Serbia, despatch, to Reuter's Telegram Company, an official communication issued last Sunday, claims that all attempts by the Austrians to halt their retreat have failed and that the Serbians are continuing to sweep the country clear of the defeated Austrians.

The Serbians are advancing successfully in the direction of Milanovatz and Belgrade, says the communication. "The enemy is retiring southeast of Obrenovatz."

"In the course of the day the Serbians captured seven officers and 2,188 men, two flags, sixteen mountain guns, other guns, munitions and supplies."

Whitby Murder Due To Jealousy Over A Woman

WHITBY, Dec. 14.-So far the investigation by Provincial Inspector Greer and the local police has thrown no further light on the mystery of the death of William Stone, the young Grand Trunk operator, who was shot at midnight on Friday in his office in the station here. Careful examination of the clothing has shown that the shot was not fired at close quarters, as there are no powder-marks around the bullet hole in the vest.

It is also practically certain, from the course the bullet took, that the murderer fired through the wicket, and that Stone was standing up at the time.

MURDERER FLED AT ONCE. That Stone was allowed to summon the police by telephone is also evidence that the murderer fled as soon as he saw that his shot had taken effect. The waiting-room was dark at the time, a light over the operator's desk being the only illumination in the place. The supposition is that the assassin slipped quietly into the dark waiting-room, lured Stone to the wicket, and shot him as he was approaching.

A WOMAN IN THE CASE. The theory that the murder was committed by a tramp, or with any idea of robbery, has been dismissed by the authorities. Nothing was touched, and Stone's watch, which was supposed to be missing, has been found at his home. It is believed that the crime was committed by some one in the vicinity, and the authorities are inclined to the belief that the murderer was a woman who had been the incentive. Stone was, according to the statement of a man who knew him well, paying attention to a young lady at Port Union and was expecting to be married in a year or two.

LIEUT. PARKER

Canadian Red Cross Official Passed Away in the Old Land.

A London cable says: The death took place at the Cecil Hotel to-night of Lieut. E. W. Parker, assistant commissioner of the Canadian Red Cross Society, who came over to England a few weeks ago at the time that Col. Hodggett succeeded the late Col. Burland as chief commissioner of this work. He took cold some days ago, and congestion of the lungs developed, terminating fatally.

Lieutenant Parker was formerly a banker and was well known in the Eastern cities of Canada, where he had been located at Ottawa, Brantford and other places. Lady Drummond, of Montreal, is a sister.

The above despatch is somewhat incorrect. Mr. Parker was never connected with the Bank of Montreal in Brantford, but he was the brother of Mr. A. G. Parker, who was a former manager here.

WANTS TWO BOATS. WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.-Col. Goethals, governor of the Panama canal zone, to-day reiterated his request that two torpedo boat destroyers be sent to canal zone waters to prevent violation of neutrality through the misuse of wireless and the taking on of supplies for belligerent vessels.

BLUNDERING INTO CONSCRIPTION London Daily Mail.-In Ulster a number of able civilians and retired officers provided with great speed a remarkable fighting force, and trained the members of it to a high degree of efficiency. What was done in Ireland is presumably feasible in Great Britain. But the recruiting department maintains its archaic unimaginative methods, and if the new levies are allowed to march to and fro without bands, without arms or uniforms, and even without badges, then the peril to the nation will steadily increase till a point is reached at which conscription becomes inevitable as the sole alternative to disaster.
