Letters from the Front

Another Interesting Letter from the Front

This week we are printing a letter from Capt. Stanley Sawell, M.C. Stan. is winning his honors on the field of battle, and we hope to be able to publish more of his interesting letters in the future. We intend that Waterdown shall know what her sons are doing at the front.

France, April 24, 1918.

Dear Dad:

I fully expected to be in the front line to-night, but I am not; rather a pleasant change, as I have my slacks on and sitting beside a fire in a nice, comfortable room. I was to be prosecutor on a court martial to-day, but it was postponed until so late in the afternoon that I sent a wire to headquarters asking permission to wait and go up in the morning, which was granted, so I have one more night to sleep in pyjamas, and also time to write a few letters.

I received your letter of March 27th, and I am surprised to know that you did not have more confidence in the British Army, though I suppose it does seem queer to you that the Huns should have had so much initial success. We all knew he would gain some ground, but as I told you in previous letters, at a terrific cost in men. There is another point, too; if we had employed the same number of men against him and his defenses the same as ours, we would have been much farther into his territory than he got into ours. His whole purpose is to break through and try and force a peace on us before the Americans get properly in. Well, after 18 months over here, I still have the greatest confidence in the French and British armies.

We have him stopped at present, and although we believe he will attack in stronger force than ever, and will no doubt gain some ground, but rest assured the situation is safe.

I am glad of your message to me, telling me you were with me in spirit. I always feel that way. Did you read Gen. Currie's order to the Canadian corps? It should go down in history as one of the greatest orders ever issued.

I think I told you in one of my other letters that John Lennox had sent me two parcels, one of cigarettes and one with a tin of real maple syrup. We are having a little bit of spring weather lately, but to-day has been rather wet.

I met Major (now Captain) Smith to-day, and had a short chat with him. He told me he was particularly pleased when he heard about my M. C., for reasons which you already know.

I am having quite a time writing this. I am staying with the Quartermaster, and I just gave him an indent for some spare parts, and of course he wanted to know why I wanted so many. He was only kidding.

Well, Dad, this is all I can think of this time. With love to all.

The East Flamboro Township Council had a busy day at their meeting on Tuesday, June 4th. Several communications were received and dealt with.

Reeve Emery was appointed a delegate to attend a meeting at Toronto on June 7th, in the interests of the United Farmers' Association.

Accounts were passed totaling upwards of eleven hundred dollars.

Court of Revision of Assessment was held at 2 o'clock. There were only five appeals entered.

A. D. Parker was successful in getting his assessment lowered \$200.00, and Miss Mary Thompson in getting 25 per cent. of her assessment struck off. The rest of the appeals were dismissed.
