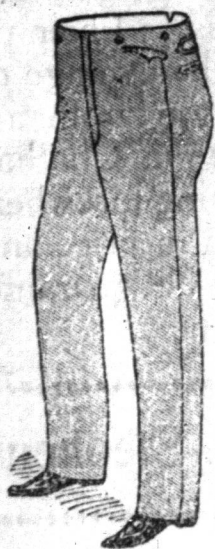

## MR. CAMPBELL WILL PRESIDE

Member for Ward Four Elected Chairman of The Public School Board.

Vote of Thanks to Dr. R. V. Bray, the Retiring Officer—The Inspector's Report.

The inaugural meeting of the Public School Board was held in Harrison Hall last evening with the following members present—Messrs. Campbell, Dr. R. V. Bray, Robertson, Bensen, Paxton, Dr. McKeough, Morley, Cornish, Heyward, and McCorvie.

Mr. Campbell was appointed to act as chairman of the new Board. In his address which he made upon his appointment he thanked the Board very kindly for the honor which they had conferred upon him and hoped that he would be able to fill the position to the satisfaction of the Board and the ratepayers.

"It is quite evident," said he, "that we will have to secure better school accommodation for the children in South Chatham. You will agree with me that the Queen Street School is not what it should be. It is my purpose to build two four-room schools with a kindergarten for each. We must also look after the question of school play grounds. It is my suggestion that the Supply Committee have a cut of the school printed on the note paper and envelopes used for school purposes. Also that limit tables be printed. I would recommend fire alarm systems in every school, also the installation of glass doors in McKeough school."

After the address the following appointed a committee to draft the standing committees for the coming year, Messrs. McKeough, Robertson, Paxton, Morley, Cornish and McCorvie.

The following is their report, which was adopted—Messrs. Morley, McKeough and Bray.

Kindergarten committee—Messrs. McCorvie, Cornish and Bensen.  
Supply committee—Messrs. Robertson, Heyward, Morley, Paxton and Cornish.

Model School committee—Messrs. Bray, Bensen and Morley.

McKeough School managers—Messrs. McCorvie, McKeough, Campbell and Heyward.

Central School managers—Messrs. Robertson, Bray, Morley and Cornish.

Queen Street managers—Messrs. Paxton and Bensen.  
Mr. McCorvie for the committee appointed last year to superintend the improvements to the McKeough school reported that two rooms had been refloored and new stairs put in and that the work was highly satisfactory.

B. Arnold resigned his position on the Public Library Board and his place was filled by J. W. Humphrey. Mr. Sheldrick's term of office on that Board was extended.

Edwin Bell was re-elected as representative from the Public School Board to the High School Board.

Dr. McKeough then moved a vote of thanks to the retiring chairman, Dr. R. V. Bray. In doing so he said:

"The Board should not let this opportunity pass without thanking our retiring chairman for his valuable services during the past year and we should in this way show our appreciation of his unfailing courtesy and businesslike methods of conducting the meetings last year. He has indeed been an excellent chairman."

Mr. Robertson seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

Dr. Bray made a very fitting reply and was pleased to see that his efforts had been appreciated.

The following gentlemen were appointed a committee to look after the matters referred to in the chairman's address, Messrs. Robertson, Paxton, Dr. McKeough, Heyward and Dr. Bray.

The Board then adjourned.

## ARCHIE WINS IN WEST YORK

Apathy of Conservative Voters Largely Responsible for the Loss.

Addington and West Hastings True to Conservatism—Close Contest in L'Islet.

Toronto, Jan. 15.—West York was carried by Archibald Campbell, Lib., to-day by a majority of 156, with one sub-division in Vaughan still to hear from that will reduce the majority somewhat. The result was entirely unexpected and was due in large part to the failure of the Conservatives in the city to poll their vote. In the 48 Toronto, sub-divisions, where the late Clarke Wallace, the former member, secured 752 majority in 1900, his brother is now in a minority of 75, Mr. Campbell also did remarkably well in the Junction, where he lives, reducing an adverse majority of 208 to 6. The bulk, therefore, of the Clarke Wallace majority of 752 disappeared in the suburban portion of the riding, and Mr. Campbell made big gains in the rural district. ADDINGTON.

Newburg, Ont., Jan. 15.—The bye-election to fill the vacancy in the House of Commons, caused by the death of John W. Bell, Con., was held in Addington to-day. The Conservative candidate, M. Avery, is undoubtedly elected, 31 out of 49 polls giving him 390 majority.

WEST HASTINGS.

Belleville, Ont., Jan. 15.—The election in West Hastings to-day, rendered necessary by the resignation of Mr. Corby, Con., was the quietest on record, and a small vote was polled. E. Gus. Porter, Con., was elected by the large majority of 496. The majorities were as follows—

KINGSTON.

Kingston, Ont., Jan. 15.—The Dominion bye-election to-day resulted in the return of Wm. Hart, the Liberal, by a majority of 753. The vote polled was: Hart, 2,117; Metcalf, 1,364. The Liberals were out in force all day, while the Conservatives showed lack of organization. The Liberals crowded the City Hall, where Mr. Hart thanked the electors for his return. He would do his best for his home. There were many other enthusiastic speeches by Liberals. The results by wards were:—

This election was rendered necessary by the appointment of the late Liberal member Mr. Britton, to the bench.

ST. JAMES, MONTREAL.

Montreal, Jan. 15.—The bye-election in St. James' division, of Montreal, to-day, to fill the vacancy in the House of Commons, caused by the elevation of Mr. Desmarais, the former Liberal member, to the bench, resulted in the election of Ald. Joseph Brunet, who defeated Mr. J. C. H. Bergeron, the Conservative candidate, by a majority of 720 votes. The vote was as follows:—Brunet, 2,930; Bergeron, 2,210. At the last general election Mr. Desmarais was elected over T. Pagnuelo by a majority of 1,841 votes.

WEST DURHAM.

Bowmanville, Ont., Jan. 15.—Robert Bell is once more the representative for West Durham in the House of Commons, having been returned to-day by a majority of 31 votes. Bowmanville turned a majority of two for Thornton, the late member, whose election was voided, into 82 for Bell. Darlington township made no gains, Bell's majority being 307, exactly the same as in the last general election. The result in Cartwright rather surprised the Liberals, Thornton's previous majority of 250 being raised to 288. Clarke township, the home of Mr. Thornton, increased his majority from 86 to 93. Newcastle turned a minority of 14 into a majority of 3 for Bell. This contest from the start has been keenly contested. The Conservatives, depended more on a thorough canvass than on public meetings. W. H. Bennett, M. P., being their only outside speaker, and he addressed only a few meetings in the villages. In Bell's interest nearly a dozen meet-

ings were held in the villages, but no meeting by either party in Bowmanville since nomination day. Hundreds of country people drove in tonight, and the streets were thronged with a big good-natured crowd.

LAVAL, Q.

Montreal, Jan. 15.—The bye-election in Laval county to-day resulted in the return of Mr. C. Wilson, the government candidate, by 22 majority over the Conservative, the vote being as follows:—Wilson, Liberal, 1,653; Leonard, Con., 1,631; Gobier, Ind. Lib., 47. The elevation to the bench of the former member, Mr. Fortier, Lib., necessitated the election.

WEST QUEEN'S, P. E. I.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Jan. 15.—The bye-election in West Queen's to fill the vacancy caused by the retirement of Sir Louis Davies, Lib., to accept a supreme court judgeship, was held to-day. The candidates were Hon. D. Farquharson, Lib., and A. A. McLean, Con. With seven places to hear from, Farquharson has a majority of 437. The city gave Farquharson a majority of 222—11 more than Sir Louis polled at the general elections. Only a small vote was polled in the country districts.

L'ISLET, Q.

Montreal, Jan. 15.—In L'Islet, where the vacancy was caused by the appointment of A. M. Dechene, Lib., to the Senate, the latest corrected returns give Carboneau, Lib., one majority over the Independent Liberal candidate.

## TWO YEARS

Proposal That Water Commissioners Shall be Elected for That Term.

The Water Commissioners held their initial meeting last evening. The Mayor was the only absentee. Dr. John L. Bray was re-elected chairman for the ensuing year.

W. A. Hadley's request for reduction in meter rate to \$2.50 was granted.

Mr. Sheldon moved that the Commissioners ask the council to petition the legislature to change the Municipal act so that the commissioners may be elected for two years, one to retire alternately.

The cash statement for December showed balance in bank of \$3706.67. Of this amount \$1,140.02 was carried over from November.
