LURING RUSSIANS ON

Japanese Are Not Opposing Gen. Kurepatkin's Advance.

of Magnitude Expected to Be Fought Within a Few Days, Perhaps At Liaoyang-Russian Attempt to Out flank Their Fees May Lead to Irrepar able Disaster-Three Bussian Warship

London, Oct. 11.-Within the last few days a change has come over the scene of the far eastern war, Kuroscene of the far eastern war, Kuropatkin, either because he is assured of his own strength, or in pursuance of orders from St. Petersburg, has suddenly taken the offensive. As a first result, the Japanese have abandoned their advanced positions at Bentsiaputze—one story going that they had unaccountably neglected to fortify a hill which commanded their lines. This, however, is scarcely credible, and the more reasonable inference is that they had no intention of seriously contesting the Russian of seriously contesting the Russian

ference is that they had no intention of seriously contesting the Russian movement.

The situation, therefore, is now reversed, and the advantage which Kuropatkin formerly possessed of operating on interior lines belongs to the Japanese. If the contending armies are approximately equal, and serious attempt on the part of the Russians to outflank their foes might easily lead to irreparable disaster. Under any circumstances, it is scarcely possible the Japanese will abandon Yentai Mines. They have now altered the railway gauge, and must rely very largely on the line from Newchwang for reinforcements and supplies. Yentai Mines are the main source of supply for Southern Manchuria, and their abandonment would be at once a direct loss to Oyama and a corresponding gain to Kuropatkin.

It would be a strange irony of fate if the famous policy of "luring" on the enemy were now adopted by the Japanese, and turned to more effective use in their hands than it was in the various stages of the Russian retreat. The position, as it now presents itself, bears striking testimony to the careful consideration the Japanese have given to the conduct of the war. They have not allowed their past successes to blind them to the magnitude of the task they have undertaken, and it will not be in the least surprising if this withdrawal of theirs be not the herald of further victories.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 11.—A battle, upon which the fate of this year's campaign in Manchuria depends, seems only a few days ahead. Advices from the front are meagre. All that is positively known officially is that Gen. Kuropatkin has cast the die at last, about faced his army and is marching resolutely against the enemy as if he resolved to do or die. According to unofficial reports, Field Marshal Oyama, at the first sign of Gen. Kuropatkin taking the offensive, began drawing in his lina and concentrating upon fortified positions north of Liaoyang.

According to the latest reports, which are contained in a despatch to the Associated Press from Mukden, dated at 6 o'clock last night, the Japanese outposts are being driven in all along the line.

The strategy of the forward movement will be concealed, as were the preparations for the advance, so that all surmises as to where Gen. Kuropatkin intends to strike are mere guess-work. It is not clear whether General Kuropatkin contemplates a blow on the left, centre or right of blow on the left, centre or right of the Japanese army, but the fact that stress is laid upon the capture of stress is laid upon the capture of Bentsiaputze, which opens the road and fords to Bensihu, 20 miles east of Liaoyang, where Gen. Kuroki crosses, and that Cossacks are already reported in the neighborhood of the stream, might foreshadow an avent reverse of the stream. of the stream, might foreshadow an exact reversal of the battle of Liao-yang, this time the Russian com-mander flanking and turning Liao-yang with his left as Field Marshal Oyama did with his right.

Japs Abandon Positions.

Japa Abandon Positions.

It is reported that the Japanese have abandoned Siandian, Siamatsze and Meichoulin, positions east of Liaoyang. In political circles considerable stress is laid upon the moral aid of the Chinese that may be expected from Gen. Kuropatkin's advancing without being compelled to abandon the sacred city of Mukden, it being remembered that the Japanese failed to reach the city of Imperial Tombs during the China-Japanese war.

SUNK BE JAP GUNS.

Russias Warships Destroyed in Port Arthur Barbon

Port Arthur Harbor.

Tokio, Oct. 11.—It is reported here that the Japanese recently centred a fire from the land positions and from the fleet blockading Port Arthur on the west harbor, with the object of lestroying the Russian fleet, and succeeded in sinking three vessels, the names and character of which are unknown.

The failure of the Port Arthur fleet to make a sortie is creating the impression that the Russians intend to destroy their ships just before the fall of the fortress, in preference to taking the risk of a sortie.

Russ Scouts Ambushed.

Mukden, Oct. 11.—On the western front Sunday a party of Caucasian scouts, while reconnoitring, fell into an ambush of two companies of Japanese infantry, who fired a volley at the scouts. Before the latter could withdraw they lost ten wounded, including a Lieutenant (Kousoff) and one man killed.

The Mikado's Message. London, Oct. 11.—A despatch to a news agency from Tokio yesterday,

"Since the commencement of hostilities our army and navy have displayed conspicuous loyalty and bravery, and with the officials and people with united minds complying with our instructions, they have hitherto steadily advanced by progressive steps. Nevertheless our prospects of final success are still distant. I earnestly hope that the sincerity of the pational spirit will enable us to reaestly hope that the sincerity of the national spirit will enable us to realize our final object.'"

London, Oct. 11.—The Morning Post's Shanghai correspondent says it is stated Lieut.-Gen. Stoessel has reported that unless relieved before December, he must surrender.

At Paris an enthusiastic Liberal convention was held Monday afternoon. The Hon. William Paterson, Minister of Customs, received the unanimous nomination of the delegates and accepted in a rousing speech. The campaign in this constituency (South Brant) opens at Burford next Monday evening.

By a standing vote A. B. Aylesworth's nomination for the County of Durham was unanimously carried at the Liberal convention held at Newcastle on Monday. Mr. Aylesworth accepted in a short speech. Mr. Robert Beith retired to enable him to run on being called to the Cabinet by Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

The Conservatives of the riding of Brantford Monday night selected W. F. Cockshutt of that city to contest the riding in their interest. In accepting the nomination Mr. Cockshutt pleaded for a clean election, stating that he would rather not take a seat in the House if corrupt
