PORTLAND, ORE., CUT OFF

Portland, Ore., Nov. 16.—Portland last night was cut off by floods from Seattle. Tacoma, Bellingham, Spokane and every point north and east of Kelso, Wash. The rainstorm that swept over the Northwest Paiffe coast Wednesday night has created a condition under which railroads ars at a standstill, or greatly interrupted. Flooded rivers have washed out bridges and wagon roads are impassible.

The only trains that entered Portland yesterday were from the south: trains from the north are stalled in and about Seattle and Tacova, and trains from the east over the Gregon Railroad and Navigation Co. tracks are stalled by a landslide at Bonneville, and passengers will be brought here by boat.

A despatch from Kelso, Wash., says a raging torrent is rushing through the lowlands in that vicinity, carrying sway thousands of dollars' worth of property. The Cowhitz River, which began to rise rapidly Wednesday, jumped to 26 feet above low water mark yesterday morning, and the big 800-toot drawbridge that spans the stream between Kelso and Catlin, unable to withstand the terrific strain, broke from its fastenings early yesterday.

Nine steamers have left Portland for the Cowlitz River to recover booms of sawlogs that broke loose near the headwaters of the river. The Williamette River, in Oregon, at points above Portland rose rapidly yesterday.

NOT FIT TO PRINT.

Bucknill Report On Chinese Vice In

London, Nov. 16.—Both Houses of Parliament last night debated the umpleasant subject arising frem the recent unauthorized publication of the contents of the Bucknill report, which gives the results of an enquiry into the conditions of Chinese labor in South Africa, and which reveals the systematic practice of unnatural vices in the Chinese compounds there.

Winston Spencer Churchill, Parliamentary Secretary to the Colonial Office, replied on behalf of the Government. He said it had been decided not to publish the Bucknill report, because if was unprintable and because the evidence upon which it was based had been obtained confidentially. The revelations of the Bucknill report, although they did not bear out the statements alleged, nevertheless disclosed a condition of affairs sufficiently unhealthy and unpatural to seal the fate of Chinese labor.
