LOSES LIFE

Tracy Waddell and Fred Monroe Broke Through Ice on the River.

onroe Finally Rescued.-Firemer Raise Waddell's Body After Diligent Search.

The whole city was thrown into a state of intense excitement this afernoon about three o'clock, when he news was circulated that Tracy Waddell, the 17-year-old son of ex-Ald. John Waddell, fell through the in the river and was drowned. The sad report proved altogether too true. The young lad lost his life despite the efforts of a brave

companion Tracy and four companions, Harry McCosh, Shirley Holmes, Fred Munroe and Clarence Stringer, were ogether on the ice during the early

together on the ice during the early part of the alternoon. They were playing a game of hookey on the ice on the creek, which is comparatively safe, and about a quarter to three they decided to try the ice on the river.

Stringer was the farthest ahead tholmes and McCosh were behind him and Munroe and Waddell followed them. When just off Tecumsuh Park at the foot of Stanley avenue, Waddell fell through the ice. Monroe, who was with him, cried to the roe, who was with him, cried to the ones ahead and then tried to get Waddell out of the water. He was unsuccessful in this, and sank with Waddell, both lads coming up under

ansuccessful in this, and sank with Waddell, both lads coming up under the see.

McCosh and Holmes were back by this time and shoved a plank out to Waddell, who was now in the water. The ice was breaking around him and it was with difficulty that he could keep to the surface.

When his companions shoved the plank out to him he tried to hold on to it but the water was cold and he was evidently becoming exhausted. With the words "I can't hold on to that, boys!" he sank below the surface of the ice and disappeared.

His companions who were all around at the time and had to watch him disappear, heipless to save him, are all quite undone by the incident. Harry McCosh said to The Planet: "He was cook and collected through it all and spoke to us, telling us what to do, but he went down before we could get anything to save him with."

Waddell was a general favorite with his companions and they all mourn his untimely death. He was a quiet boy with good habits and pleusing gentlemanly manner. His parents are prostrated with grief.

The fire department was called out and Fireman Tucker and others worked with ladders and pike poles in their efforts to locate the body.

The sad accident has cast a gloom over the entire community and everywhere sympathy is expressed for the over the entire community and every-where sympathy is expressed for the

pereaved parents BODY FOUND. Chief Pritchard threw out ladders and grappling irons and the ice, which was a mere tissue, was broken in all directions. Meanwhile he had sent to Hadley's for a punt and manned it with Mossrs. Fullerton, Bellaire and Tucker.

After a short time the trio located the body with their grapplier body. the body with their grappling hooks and at 3.45 it was brought to the

surface.

Dr. McKeough was sent for but, in spite of the most earnest efforts by physicians it was impossible to restore life.




