THE SALVATION ARMY'S
WORK OF IMMIGRATION.

The 13,000 who Came This Year
not Enough, will Bring 25-
000 Next Year.

The Salvation Army has just closed a very successful year of immigration work, having brought out over thirteen thousand settlers to Canada, but seeing that this amount was very far short of meeting the great demand for farm help and laborers of various kinds, have decided to bring out sand, principally for agricultural purposes.

Ten steamers have been chartered, the first will arrive in Halifax about the last of February and will be followed by one each week at St. John or Halifax up to the last of April.

Adjutant Jennings, who represents the work for the Maritime Provinces, is anxious that all who need help should be supplied, while the immigrants are landing at Halifax and St. John, as it is very difficult to get them to come down this way after the boats begin to land at Quebec.

Last year a number of applications were not filled owing to the fact that some farmers delayed the matter until late in the season; those who will need laborers this winter or in the coming spring should apply now stating the date men will be required. This would prevent them having to wait a time or being disappointed altogether. Application forms can be secured at any time by applying to Adjutant Jennings, Box 477, Halifax, N. S.
