## Progress in and Around the PRAIRIE PROVINCES

**CARDSTON'S STRONG WOMAN**  
Cardston, Alta.—Race distinction during these warlike times is the cause of much trouble.  
"Stinking Irishman" was sufficient to cause a violent fist encounter at the J. W. Woolf ranch last week. The case was tried by Major H. B. Brown, J.P. Apparently the quarrel arose from a casual conversation between John Johansen of Woolford and W. McCullough. The conversation grew heated and in the course thereof, Johansen called McCullough a "stinking Irishman," which was sufficient to make the representative of the Emerald Isle get down from the haystack upon which he was working and "defend his country."  
Ranch hands soon had the fighters separated. Johansen laid a complaint of assault and battery. The J.P. fined McCullough one dollar and costs with the statement that were it lawful he would fine both.  
On the same day of the above trial Justice E. N. Barker heard a case of a somewhat peculiar nature. Mrs. L. R. Wright laid a complaint of house-breaking against one Mrs. A. Sierk. It seems that the latter woman has claim of some sort upon the husband of the plaintiff and went one day to take forcible possession of his household. Being a strong woman, she broke in the door, which the frightened wife had locked, and drove the rightful inmate out. She then assumed full control of the place and settled herself to read comfortably upon the sofa.

**REGINA'S ASSESSMENT**  
Regina—Regina's scheme to solve the assessment problem for 1915 has met with very favorable comment, and from inquiries which have been made it is likely that other cities will take similar steps. The Regina scheme aims to secure valuations from the ratepayers and strike an equitable assessment on that basis. This step seems necessary owing to the fact that properties are not as realizable now as during the early part of the year.  
The Labor Temple at Regina has now been completed and was officially opened on December 23rd. This marks another step forward in the labor movement in Regina.

has taken an important step, having arranged a Hebrew educational school, which has been named "The Free Hebrew School of Abraham," with T. Pearlman as president.  
A basis for practical co-operation in religious work, has been arrived at by the Presbyterians and Methodists of Regina. These two denominations have been negotiating with a view to church union or some such scheme which would have a similar effect for about a year past. A central committee will now govern future extensions, and districts allotted to either of the denominations shall be under their exclusive direction for a period of five years unless the denomination shall fall within three months to establish work of a permanent nature, in which event then other denomination shall be allowed to enter the field. The central committee has been elected as follows: Methodist denomination, Rev. Dr. Milliken, Rev. J. A. Spencey, A. H. Tasker and T. W. Peart; Presbyterian denomination, Rev. M. A. McKinnon, Rev. Dr. J. W. Nelson, Henry Black, and F. W. Reilly. It is expected that the arrangements between these two denominations will effectively prevent overlapping of such a nature as has existed in the past.

The results of the crop for the year 1914 have been satisfactory. Certain districts suffered severely from drought at the critical period, and the total yield is consequently less than last year, but with the higher prices prevailing the value of the grain produced is somewhat greater. More land is being brought under cultivation, and owing to the early harvest and a favorable autumn it is expected that the record acreage will be under crop next year.  
Mixed farming is receiving more attention with satisfying results, and more live stock is being raised.  
The flour mills are well employed, but other manufacturing industries are quiet.  
Trade conditions are not altogether satisfactory, but credit is granted less freely than formerly.  
There has been a decline in realty values with few transactions.  
The North West provinces undoubtedly are passing through a period of stress, but with their great areas of good farm lands still uncultivated capable of producing vast food supplies, we look to the future with a justifiable measure of confidence.

### THE CANADIAN CROP OF 1915

Forty-eight per cent. more land has been prepared for crop next spring than in any previous year, according to Hon. Robert Rogers, minister of public works. The information on which the statement was based appears in a special report on farming conditions by Mr. Bruce Walker of the interior department. Two million bushels of seed wheat, of barley and of oats, or six million bushels in all, have been purchased to provide farmers with sufficient seed grain next spring.  
This is part of Canada's splendid response to the demand for agricultural produce. The 1915 crop, with favorable weather conditions, should surpass our previous crops by between fifty and one hundred per cent, counting the inevitable increase of acreage which will be plowed next spring. The 1915 crop will probably be sold at higher prices than have been obtained in the history of Canada and the receipts will swell the credit side of our national ledger.

### ALBERTA'S CROP REPORTS

The Alberta crop report to the Dominion government says:  
Most of the root crops were up to the standard in northern Alberta, but, except on summer fallow and irrigated lands, were decidedly lower in southern Alberta on account of the severe drought of the summer. The quality of the roots, however, seems to be universally good, especially of potatoes, which are everywhere said to be large and of excellent quality. Small-

er areas of fall wheat are being sown, the farmers have been discouraged by the fact that for the last two winters there has not been sufficient snow to protect from winter-killing. Winter rye is gaining favor as a harder crop. More fall ploughing than usual has been done, some land even being packed and harrowed for the spring. In various districts complaints are made of the destruction caused by gophers which breed on neighboring vacant lands in the possession of rail companies and speculators and do not get poisoned. Our correspondent at Holden, northern Alberta, states that in his district crops have given splendid yields, exceeding the most conservative estimates. Potatoes yielded an average of 400 bushels per acre and are sold at 40 cents per bushel. Prolonged rains on the stocks immediately after the close of harvest had a marked influence in depreciating the grades, such as going out of condition, tough, etc., accelerated no doubt by premature stock threshing as well as improper methods of stacking.

### BASSANO FISH STORY

The latest fish story that has been sprung on the public—a story which "out-whops" some of the most famous of the Whopper Club series—is that told by J. Jones, an inspector in the agricultural branch of the Canadian Pacific, whose activities are confined to the Rosemary colony, near Bassano.  
There is nothing of the piking attitude about the story but the fish, the fish were pike. It appears that there has been started among the fish of the Bow river a "back to the land" movement, with the irrigated land preferred. Mr. Jones says that on the land, or on one particular farm, in the Rosemary colony, the water was turned into the ditches one morning for two hours and then turned off. When it had all seeped away into the ground there were enough pike found to feed thirteen men for one meal. Since that time a number of fish have been obtained. In fact, there seems to be a serious sort of mania among these fish to get out of the water at the earliest possible moment.  
It appears that many of the irrigation ditches are full of fish and in some places one of the favorite recreations is to go out and "land" a flock of fish for breakfast.
