ST. JOHN MARKET FEES. Beef per quarter, four cents. Hogs of two hundred pounds or under, five cents, each additional hundred pounds, one cent.

Butter in tub, jar, pail or firkin, of ten pounds and under, two cents; every additional ten pounds or division thereof, one cent.

Butter in roles and lard in cakes, for every ten pounds or under two cents. Tallow for every ten pounds or under, one cent.

Cheese for every ten pounds or under, one cent. Potatoes per one hundred pounds, two cents.

Turnip per one hundred pounds, one cent. Oysters in tub or other vessels per gallon, two cents.

Oysters in shell per bushel, two cents. Turkey chick, one cent. Geese each, one cent.

Pigeons per dozen, one cent. Partridges, fowl or ducks per pair, one cent. Flour or meal per one hundred pounds, two cents.
