**Hot Shots Against Union in
Antis' Manitoba Advertising**

Paid Newspaper Space Marks Opening of Campaign in Win-
nipeg on Behalf of Continuing Church--Presbyterians
Warned--People Urged to Beware of Deceiving Figures
From Unionists--Ad. Declares Vote to Eate Disappointing
to United Church

Winnipeg, Feb. 2-- With
a half page bristling with
black face type the Church
Union opposition disclosed a
new phase to-day in the an-
imated fight with a paid ad-
vertisement space in local
dailies.

It is said to be the opening
of an intensive campaign in
the West, where newspaper
space paid for at current rat-
es will tell the story of the
Presbyterian Church in Can-
ada and why it will survive,
as the advertisement says,
stronger and more vital in
Canada. This advertisement
is signed, "The Manitoba
Presbyterian Church."

The heading in full face
seventy two point type an-
nounces that "Presbyterians,
the Presbyterian Church in
Canada will continue." And
urges that Presbyterians be-
ware of deceiving figures by
Unionists. It adds that "The
Unionists rushed on at the
earliest possible moment in
Saskatchewan and Alberta in
winter a vote by open voting
in prairie missions and aug-
mented charges which are
under the direction of Union

officialdom. They did this to
get an accumulation of figures
to parade for effect in the
east."

Causes Big Sensation
Continuing the big adver-
tisement, which to-night has
proven the most sensationa
news story in the daily pap-
ers, says: "To make their fig-
ure of 844, claimed by them
up till 24th instant, they ad-
mit 327 in Saskatchewan
alone and 56 in Alberta. This
is nearly half of their total
vote. The preponderance of
these places are, as everyone
knows, small points and do
not represent in the aggre-
gate a great number of per-
sons. The 186 non-concurr-
ing congregations in Ontario
alone represent, in persons
and property many times
over the 327 congregations,
claimed by Unionists from
Saskatchewan. Unionists
rolled up figures from new
parts of other provinces in
the same way. The Presby-
terian congregations that
have voted against the Union
up to the date mentioned, re-
ported as 267, are substantial
congregations, and they ex-
tend from coast to coast.
Many of these 267 old and
steady Presbyterian congreg-
ations have been fountain
heads for the support of
Home Missions. They will
continue to maintain their
work in our West. Mere cat-
ch votes picked off by Union
propagandists, will not deter
them; no Presbyterian in our
West need fear that his church
is going to be lost. And re-
member, that the Continuing
Church gets its full share of
the general property of the
church. That is to be divided
up by a commission. Those
fine old churches that have
stood out are assured of am-
ple equipment, out of the
church's general property to
go on with in full vigor, im-
mediately. Those churches
were founded and are now
headed by eminent men who
have been delights of the
church, and their missionary
and educational work will go
on with all the determination,
zeal and self-sacrifice which
has always characterized them

powerful Unionist propagan-
da publicity department had
the people here, as elsewhere
hoodwinked into thinking the
opponents to be a negligible
disgruntled handful. But 267
strong, healthy congregations
from the very sinew of Can-
ada have shattered all that
false pretension and come up
emphatically for the old
church. And there are many
more big congregations to
follow. You will not vote on
an abstract question now.
You will vote whether you
will stay with a vital, strong
continuing Presbyterian
Church in Canada or become
lost in a big parliament-made
ecclesiastical machine. The
choice is easy. Better at here
to the tried and true than ex-
periment with a mere novelty
in the world's church experi-
ence. This so-called Union
measure means to Presbyter-
ians the loss of everything
distinctive in their creed,
system and traditions. It
means the surrender of their
doctrine, their operations and
their property, to be in con-
trol of a different body, im-
mensely larger.

Unionists have got a wrong
notion if they think Mani-
toba is going to be allowed to
go by default. Congregations
rose en mass in Ontario a-
gainst clerical domination;
they will do the same here
Meanwhile, maintain Presby-
terian firmness and reserve
Insist on public discussion of
the question and a hearing
for each side so that the facts
can be known. Public discus-

ion and free voting have al-
ways resulted in an anti-
union vote. Remember, that
nothing now is surer than
that the Presbyterian Church
in Canada will continue."

**CANADA'S LOWEST
DEATH RATE**

That the general death rate for
the year 1924 will be the lowest on
record is forecasted in the Statist-
ical Bulletin of a Life Insurance
Company doing business in Canada

as well as in the United States.
The prediction is based on the
cumulative death rate of more than
fifteen million Industrial policy-
holders calculated up to December
15th, 1924.

The principal causes of death, in
order of magnitude, were; organic
diseases of the heart, 123 per 100,
000 population; tuberculosis 101;
cancer 89; pneumonia 89; chronic
nephritis 65; cerebral hemorrhage
59. As compared with the preced-
ing year, there has been a remark-
able decline in the death rate from
diphtheria, measles and scarlet
fever.
