The Able Lay Delegate from Waterloo  
Pays His Respects to Goderich.

This pleasant old town is beautifully  
situated on a commanding bluff overlook-  
ing the great Lake Huron. Its cool sum-  
mer breezes, which blow pretty con-  
stantly from this great northern lake,  
render it a very desirable summer resi-  
dence for people of warm climes, who in  
considerable numbers spend the hot  
months at the Point Farm and other  
summer hotels. The town is laid out on  
the general plan of a spider's web, which  
is very confusing to a stranger, for, like  
other spider webs, though the way in can  
be found easily enough, the way out is  
apt to be very entangling. Very appro-  
priately, the court house like the spider,  
occupies the centre of the web, and is  
surrounded by a park of about five or  
six acres, well shaded by handsome  
trees. The park is bounded by the  
principal stores and hotels, disposed  
along the periphery of an octagon, from  
the eight corners of which streets are  
projected into the surrounding country.  
These streets are well laid out, and look  
very pleasant at this season, with their  
fine shade trees, and comfortable and in  
a number of instances, quite stately re-  
sidences. We were surprised, however,  
to notice her bovine majesty, the Cow,  
in full possession of the Queen's high-  
way in this enlightened and progressive  
county seat. As we passed some fine,  
healthy specimens of her majesty, chew-  
ing calmly the cud of contentment and  
sweet grass, and dropping her visiting-  
card on the sidewalk with silent dignity  
for the benefit of incautious pedestrians,  
our memory reverted instinctively to the  
days of our bondage in Watsega. We  
happily departed, when to go after  
dark implied a job for the bootblack in  
the morning.
