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
## THE FAIR IMPOSTOR.

**City Council Meeting.**

Councillors Ellis, Kennedy, Collier, Martin and Mayor Gibbs were present at last evening's meeting.

Inspector General Sullivan sent in a note asking that the street running north from McCourt's house on Duckworth Street be cleaned up. Mr. Johnson will be ordered to remove the material there left over after building, and should he fail to do so within a reasonable time he will be prosecuted. The Secretary reported that he had written him to do this work several days ago.

Secretary Harris of the Board of Works wrote asking that the street line be defined where the Poor Asylum grounds abut on Hamilton Street. The Engineer will attend to it.

Mr. Hepburn, Secretary of St. Andrew's Church, asked that the retaining wall that founded lately on Harvey Road, rear of the Presbyterian Church property, be rebuilt. Enquiry will be made.

Colin Campbell asked the Council to read some literature about "Tarvia," a material for making roads. The Council will consider the matter.

The Clothing Factory people offered \$150 for the public lane leading from Duckworth Street to Water Street, which they have already closed up with a fence. They wanted to erect a clothing factory there and wish to square off the property. The Council considered that the property, which belongs to the public, is too valuable to sell to them for this sum, but under the circumstances will let them have it for \$200.

James Dobbin asked permission to light a fire in order to boil tar at 201 Water Street, where he is repairing a house. He was referred to the Fire Department.

R. Varian wants to build a two-story frame building on Carew St. for livery stable. Ordered that he be asked to send in plans.

Mr. A. Lindsay asked that the drain on Circular Road opposite his house be repaired in order to prevent the water flowing into his garden. This work will be done.

J. Skinner was given permission to erect a scaffold to make repairs to his house at Beck's Cove.

W. Burt was given permission to put a new rail on the gallery of his house but not to erect a new gallery. The application of R. Purcell for permission to put a new roof to his house, 27 1/2 Water Street, was referred to the Engineer.

J. P. McLoughlin was also given leave to erect a scaffold to repair his house, 312 Water Street.

Mrs. Jackman, who wrote about a fence and gallery near her house on Pleasant Street, will be reminded that she will have to conform to the street line.

Permission was given to Mr. Angel to erect a cooage on Hamilton St. James Ryan, of Bonavista, sent in a plan of house that he purposes to build on Rennie's Mill Road. Mr. W. J. Ellis, who submitted the plan, was given permission to build. The street line will be given.

The Solicitor sent in his report on the status of the people who have built houses on and near the Battery Road. The land there was leased to He Reid Nfld. Co. by the Government and those who erected houses there have no titles. They are simply squatters and they built without the authority of the City Council.

The report of the City Engineer was tabled. He opined that Ed. Langmead of the Southside was about to build a stable in a most unsuitable place. He will be ordered not to go on with the work.

T. Lawlor will be allowed to build a stable on Fleming Street as per report of the Health Officer, who also asked the Council to have the drain in the west side of Merrymeeting Road cleaned up.

Dr. Brehm further reported that there were nine cases of diphtheria and one case of typhoid being nursed at home.

The residents of Springdale Street and Hagerty's Lane will be asked to connect with the sewer.

Mr. Thomson will be given permission to build a reservoir in connection with his tannery, provided that the people on the South Side be not disturbed from having the use of the water for domestic purposes. He will be requested to submit plans giving all the details of the proposed work.

The reports of the Sanitary Supervisor and the Waste Water Inspector were submitted.

After passing the pay rolls the meeting closed at 11 o'clock.

**Two Firemen Killed.**

And More Than a Score Overcome by Fumes at Warehouse Fire at New York.

New York, June 6.—Two firemen were killed and more than a score were overcome by stifling fumes in fighting a stubborn warehouse fire near the Hudson River front to-day.

Ten of the firemen overcome were caught in a back draught on the 4th floor of the building. Two men who managed to avoid the worst of the burst of flame and dense smoke screamed from a window for help. Ladders were raised and the unconscious men carried down.

Fireman Timothy Cotter died on the sidewalk, after having been carried from an upper floor, where he had lain unconscious for more than an hour in a pool of water.

Fireman William Healy was taken out of the building dead.

Three of the injured firemen are in hospital in a serious condition.

The fire was in the five-story building at 110-116 Washington Street, occupied by the Free Storage Bonded Warehouse.

The loss is estimated at \$75,000.


