

The thermometer registered 80 degrees in the shade, but he finished in good condition. On Sunday night he slept in a barn with his fellow cadets; turned out at 5 a.m., and washed at the village pump. It was already hot when the march started. Soon after the sun was boiling. After ten miles some of the cadets gave up, and were put in amwhen all were getting fagged, some body suggested the Prince should fall out, but he refused. The march was finished at mid-day. The Prince slept for two hours after which he swam across the pond.
