Cyclist Killed.

Benjamin Wilson Hit Fence Post Head First When His Machine Swerved.

Toronto, July 28.—After daring death scenes of times, Benjamin Wilson, aged 32, a motor cyclist from Rochester and a former Toronto boy, was killed instantly when he lost control of his motorcycle and crashed into the fence at the races held at Exhibition Park on Saturday under the auspices of the Ontario Motorcycle Association. A crowd of six thousand people was present.

The accident occurred at the seventh lap of the five mile race. Wilson, who was demonstrating the Jefferson machine, and who was one of the last to come on to the stretch, tore down the track at 45 miles an hour and when he hit the curve his machine bore straight for the high board fence. He swung it onto the grass, when the machine swerved again and crashed into the fence. Four posts were broken off and 25 feet of fence was torn away by the impact.

When the machine hit the fence the

rider shot into the air, turned a double somersault and hit one of the posts head first. The machine bounced into the air, somersaulted and struck Wilson as it fell. Death was instantaneous, the skull having been fractured in several places. The other riders continued the race, and at its conclusion the meet was called off.

An inquest was opened on Saturday night and the jury brought in a verdict of accidental death, expressing the opinion that a mechanical defect had occurred in the machine which caused Wilson to lose control of it.

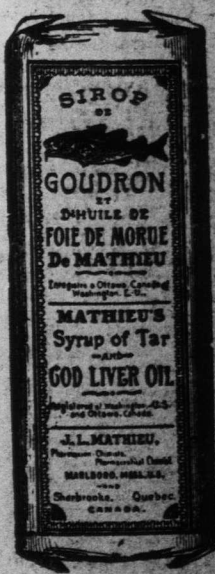

Narrow Escapes.

Mr. Philip Hanley, while crossing Water Street last evening, had a startling experience. A motor car which he did not notice sped along, and in jumping back Mr. Hanley fell, but fortunately escaped with only a few slight bruises. Auto speeding is becoming a menace of late.

According to Professor D. W. Edge, worth David, of the University of Sydney, Australia, the deposits of coal discovered by the Shackleton and Scott expeditions in the Antarctic will perhaps prove to be one of the largest unworked coal fields in the world. Wild of the Shackleton expedition, discovered seven seams of coal outcropping in a great cliff face of sandstone and shale. The thickness of these seams inclusive of a few dry binks, was seven feet. Specimens chopped out by Wild with his ice axe have been analyzed at Sydney and show the coal to be of workable quality. Scott's geologists traced this field for a distance of 650 miles, extending northward from the head of the Beardmore glacier.
