Week of Prayer

Opened at the Congregational Church.

The Week of Prayer was opened last night in the Congregational Church. The service was one of humiliation and thanksgiving and was conducted by the pastor, the Rev. Mr. Thomas. He was assisted by many pastors of city churches. The Rev. Mr. Matthews offered the opening prayer and the Rev. Dr. Fenwick read the Scripture Lesson. The chairman spoke a few words but what he said touched the hearts of those present. He paid a personal tribute to the memory of the late Dr. Rogers who passed away during the year, and had entered into the "rest that remaineth for the people of God."

The speaker of the evening was the Rev. Mr. Whitemarsh, who opened his remarks with an illustration to make clear the subject of the evening—Humiliation and Thanksgiving. He then enumerated what especially called for humiliation and what for thanksgiving. Among the former, he dwelt particularly on a spirit of irreverence which seemed to be prevalent. He spoke for twenty minutes and the discourse was deeply impressed on the mind of the congregation.

After the address, a service of song and prayer continued until quarter past nine, when the Benediction was pronounced by the Rev. Mr. Sutherland, of the Presbyterian Church. To-night the second service will be held in the Kirk and the principal address given by the Rev. Dr. Cowperthwaite.
