How Our Naval Divers Go Down to Repair Our Damaged Fighting Ships.

Our naval gumners do mighty work, out we also require seamen able to walk the sea floor to keep the ship clean below the water-line, and to repair the accidents of battle. Each of our battleships carries eight trained divers and each cruiser four; these men are giants physically, and get high pay.

Let the ship be rammed or badly noled in action below the water-line, and the diver calls for his dressers. for he's now the star actor of a drama which may turn into tragedy involving a thousand lives.

The dressing takes long to write. but it moves, as things do in our Navy, with astonishing speed. Here's the portable telephone and the electric searchlight, and thus, completely equipped, the diver goes over to report the damage.

Even in port the "cobbler" goes below and scrapes the cruiser's bottom, a process which may add a couple of knots to her speed and make all the difference between safety and capture or destruction at the hands of an overwhelming force.

For this work scaffolds are rigged up and boats launched with a panoply of steel brushes and other gear which tears off the baracles and weeds that incrust the steel hull, perhaps thirty

feet down in the green waters. This is no work for the weakling or the tippler. The would-be diver must be a superb specimen; a clean and sober liver, for the pressure of water at great depths is fearfully trying to heart, lungs, and stomach. Think of eighty pounds on every square inch of the body! From such a depth the man must be hauled up slowly so that his vital organs may adjust themselves to the relaxing pressure. Bleeding at the nose and ears occurs, and there are terrible risks from sharks and other monsters

of the deep. Where Divers are Trained.

Down at Portsmouth is the queerest 'school" in the world where these warship "cobblers" are trained. It's a circular tank like a gas-holder in miniature, with an outside stairway leading to a gallery above. At a height of five feet or so is a range of plate glass windows through which the instructor can put the novice

through his slow and ghostly paces. He is taught to use hammer and chisel, to scrape a hull and recover lost anchor-chains. In six months the man is a skilled artisan under water, and then he's drafted to battleship or cruiser, where he's a priviledged person with special pay—a unique sort of "ship's doctor," called into conglass or mirrors, it is entirely new, an sultation when the steel monster is hit in a vital place, and none can say how long she has to live.

There are three kinds of round shoulders, the ordinary round back. the round hollow back and the round back due to forward displacement of the shoulders.
