Bell Island Sports.

The relay race was won by the Star team, consisting of R. Jackson, P. Murphy and J. Butler. In the evening the Society held an At Home in the Star Hall, at which a very large gathering was present. The C.C.C. band were over from town and furnished excellent music. At midnight, Mrs. Power, M.B.E., graciously presented the prizes to the winners of the day's events. Mr. J. A. Greene, chairman of the committee of management, presided, and in his address made special reference to the C.C.C. football team: Messrs. W. Clare, A. Galguy, T. Christopher, M. Madigan and C. Spurrell. Capt. L. C. Murphy received the medals on behalf of the team, and in well chosen words complimented the promoters and all others connected with the sports on the splendid success achieved. A patriotic address, which was received with much applause, was delivered by Magistrate Power. The electric lighting of the hall and general decorations were beautifully done, thanks to Messrs. J. P. Burke, of the Wabana Council, and Mr. R. Costigan, Chairman of the Sports Committee, who aided largely to the success of the day.

At the City Hall.

The regular weekly meeting of the City Council was held yesterday. The Mayor and all the Councilors were present.

It was reported that a wooden structure was erected near the Post Office without evidently a permit. Such building is contrary to law. It was ordered that enquiries be made by the engineer. A similar report was made as to a garage on Springdale Street.

Head Constable Sparrow is to be engaged for Bannerman Park. Certain residents of Allendale Road petitioned for a drain. Ordered that a report from the Engineer be secured.

W. & G. Rendell wrote again as to the Brantford materials. It was ordered that the Messrs. Rendell be asked to state definitely if the material is fireproof.

The Imperial Oil Co. offered gasoline for the new motor.

The C. L. B. Band's request for a permit to hold concerts in Bannerman Park every Tuesday evening was agreed to.

Messrs. Thomas and Kelly called the attention of the Council to a building being erected on Barnes Road on the wrong line of street. The Engineer to inquire and report.

Mrs. Frost, Rennie's Mill Road, submitted a plan of street fence. Has to be inquired into as the new street was not shown.

Blackwood & Emerson, on behalf of Mr. C. R. Thompson, requested information as to the Council's intention to extend water and sewerage along Cook Pit Road. The matter is being considered by the Council and a reply will be given as soon as possible.

The City Engineer's and Health

Officer's reports were read.

A permit will go to the Public Works Dept., to open pavement on Water St., near Seamen's Institute, to erect an arch for the coming of the Prince of Wales.

The Mayor reported that all preparations had been made for the erection of new houses on Quidi Vidi Road. The lumber, cement and other necessary materials had been arranged for and sites were laid out.

The weather of late has been very stormy, and there is little doing on the water, as yet, though there is a fair sign of fish on trawls when boats can get out to make a set. Trap fishing, because of rough water is not extra. A man belonging to Lead Cove made a haul of 50 quintals on Wednesday, 9th inst. while another resident of Whales Brook, Stephen Row, had the misfortune of having his trawl all torn up yesterday, an iceberg doing the damage.

Will you permit me also to say a word regarding the difference in treatment accorded sailors and soldiers. I would like to know just why it is that the soldiers only are receiving a gratuity. Was the service of the soldiers any better than that of the sailors? All were fighting in and for the same cause, and it is indeed invidious to single out the soldiers for special recognition in the way of a war gratuity and ignore the sailors. In justice to them and all that they did they should be given a fair show, and equally, with the men of the Regiment should be given a similar sum as war bonus or gratuity or anything you like to call it, so long as they get it. They deserve it, if over men did.

Sagana From Labrador.

The SS. Sagana arrived in port yesterday from the Labrador ports. Captain Parsons reports having met with foggy weather during the whole trip, and except when crossing the Straits, encountered ice all the way to Paged Islands. On the way South the steamer was unable to make Bolster's Rock, Comfort Bight or Wolf Islands, but called at all the other ports. When the Sagana left to come South only six schooners had reached the coast. Three had gone North of Paged Islands and three were at Indian Ticks. There was no sign of fish on the coast up to the 10th, but on that date a few salmon and cod were taken at Spear Harbor and Battle Harbor. While conditions are not bright, Captain Parsons says it is too early yet to conjecture as to the voyage. The Sagana brought a small freight and a few passengers.
