Search for Polar Land.

HOPE NOT YET ABANDONED.
 Halifax, N.S., Nov. 12.—Seven steamers are coasting the ocean, off the Nova Scotia coast, for Captain Wheeler and crew of the American steamer Polar Land. Another day has passed since the wireless operator sent out the last S.O.S. call on Sunday, stating that the ship was being abandoned, and nothing further has been heard of the fifty men. Every effort is being made to find the missing crew, and hopes are still held out for their safety.

Seven Ships Searching.
 The search for the missing men, which the Kanawha commenced, continues. The waters in the vicinity of where the Polar Land sent out her last S.O.S. are being carefully combed. Last night, Mr. C. H. Harvey, Marine and Fisheries Agent here, stated that seven ships were engaged in the search for the missing crew. They are the steamers Arammore, Strathfillan, Pioneer, Yellowstone, Ninian, and the U.S. Coast Guard cutter Seneca and Androscoogin.

The Arammore was ordered from Flint Island to the scene. The Strathfillan is bound from Glasgow to New York, and the Pioneer from Montreal to an American Atlantic port. The steamer Yellowstone sailed from Halifax on Friday last for Havre, while the Seneca left Port Hawkesbury yesterday. The two Coast Guard cutters were asked to join in the search by the American Consul here, at the suggestion of Mr. Harvey, Marine and Fisheries agent here.

Civilizing or Corrupting.

Taking cigarette smoking as a standard of civilization, the savages of British East Africa are fast catching us up. A few years ago the natives were content with crude raw tobacco mixed with all sorts of things. Now they are smoking cigarettes at the rate of 25,000,000 a month. An official of the British-American Tobacco Company told me that the Kavaronos, a tribe on the shores of Lake Victoria, Nyanza, and one of the proudest, most moral and most naked in Africa, have an improved method of smoking. "We packed our cigarettes in boxes of four," he said, "because the Kavaronos smoke four at a time, putting one in each corner of the mouth, and one in each nostril."—London (Eng.) Express.

French Women Marry Chinese Coolies

French women in the desolated areas are marrying Chinese members of coolie battalions engaged in the work of restoring property. The Minister of the Interior is very much disturbed and has warned the Mayors of districts to protect French women from such a union. In his circular, the Minister of the Interior points out that the Chinese will after the expiration of their contracts return to China, where French women who have married them will be in a precarious situation in view of the smallness of the wages paid there. We'll Wait in Patience.

A committee of international experts has been sitting in solemn conclave to determine what constitutes a new-laid egg. The public, which has endured many things at the hands of what may be called the war-egg, will be disappointed to find that the weighty answer cannot be given until 1921, when a meeting of the International Association of Poultry Inspectors and Investigators will be held at The Hague. Who shall determine the new-laid egg? The much-travelled egg from Siberia was the sport of speculation and big dealers, and a thing of doubtful culinary value, but even now, when such distant products cease to form a part of the daily food of Europeans, there is a certain antiquity about the cheap egg that is scarcely pleasant. The rapid encroachment of the keeping of the domestic hen, who will cluck the announcement that an egg is ready for use, seems the only way in which the public shall be enabled to define what a new-laid egg really is.—Christian Science Monitor.

Werner Horn Sentenced to 10 Years.

Werner Horn, the German, who attempted to destroy the St. Croix bridge by dynamiting it on February 2, 1915, has been sentenced to ten years in the penitentiary. In passing sentence, Judge Barry told the prisoner that he had not qualified as a belligerent under the provisions of the Hague Tribunal, and, therefore, his offence could not be looked upon as an act of war, in the eyes of international law, as he had pleaded. The only point in the prisoner's favor was that he had waited until passenger trains had gone over before blowing up the bridge, evidently because he did not want to be responsible for causing injury or death to defenceless civilians. When sentence had been passed Horn said he wanted to make a protest, that because his Fatherland had signed the Peace Treaty he was not punishable, but he was ordered removed to jail, and any more protests will have to be made from the Dochester Penitentiary.


