## Sponge a Queer Fish.

Sponges were long thought to be agetables, but they are now known to be animals. Their appearance when they come to the market is so unlike that of the living sponge that it is quite to be expected that seeing it on-ly in use one would hardly suspect its origin. The sponge grows mostly at the bottom of the sea on rocks to which it is fixed by a kind of root. It is made up of a jellylike substance and a frame work of tough fibers. This fromework is really the skeleton of the sponge; it is the sponge of comnerce. The skeleton is covered with jellylike substance and is sticky when taken out of the water. Sponges are usually buried in dry sand for a time until the jelly part decays. They are then put in wire cages into the sea until they are washed clean.


