Fishermen, Consider This!

In the present election the Opposition party appeal to the common sense and intelligence of the electors. There is no attempt to make any appeal to the people's passions or prejudices. This unwarlike work is left to the Government and those supporting them. In reviewing the history of the past three years during which Coaker and Squires held control it is only necessary to compare the circumstances of the people with the conditions that prevailed up to 1919. Are the fishermen as well off and independent to-day as they were then? Are business conditions as satisfactory to-day as they were under the late Government? Are the tradesmen employed to-day at remunerative employment as they were four years ago? Are the laborers finding work at good wages to-day as they did before 1919? In a word, are the wheels of progress revolving as hopefully and as satisfactorily as they did before Coaker and Squires obtained control? Let the fishermen, merchants, laborers and mechanics answer. We contend that the reply will be a unanimous "No," and that the verdict of conscience will be that conditions to-day are deplorable. The fishermen know to the cost that the flourishing industry in which they were once happily engaged has been destroyed by Coaker. The merchants realize that the trade depression existing to-day is due to Coaker and Squires. The laborers and mechanics know that the unemployment from which they and their families suffer was brought about by incapable Government. Realizing this it is natural to expect that men who have suffered so will throw up their hats for such a Government? Is it not probable that when the opportunity is given them on May 3rd that they will vote against the party responsible for the agonizing conditions brought upon them by the gang of incapables who now control the Government? Let any sensible man think for a moment and ask himself, "Shall I vote for a continuance of such conditions that are driving the young men out of the country?" He certainly must conclude that it would be criminal folly to do so. Every man owes a duty to himself, his family and his country and must if he is sane and unbiassed vote for the party most likely to improve existing conditions. We all know that the present Government have proved themselves incapable of governing in the interests of the public. They have simply governed in their own interests. The only hope for the country then is a change of Government. Bennett and his associates will in directing our public affairs bring into operation the experience and business qualifications necessary to produce order out of chaos. The people then should flock to Bennett's standard like they did to the great Emancipator, the late Charles Fox-Bennett in 1869 and save the country from total ruin. It is their interest to do so. It is their duty to do so as Newfoundlanders who want to live in their own country. We feel certain that they will do so and that they will not shirk this duty on polling day and will save Newfoundland's integrity and independence as their forefathers did in 1869. They will vote for BENNETT AND BETTER TIMES.

Well Done, Placentia and St. Mary's!

Messrs. Walsh, Sullivan and Stinnett who returned to the city last week from a canvass of the eastern portion of the District and who left again for Placentia on Saturday last, report "a clean sweep" for the Opposition in the section visited. The three candidates are natives of the District and all are deservedly popular. They lose no opportunity to serve the interest of their constituents and during a very trying period since 1919, when conditions were terrible for his work with unremitting zeal to help many that would have found it impossible to prosecute the fisheries but for the aid given them by their representatives. This is particularly true of Mr. W. J. Walsh, who has always been most assiduous in his endeavours to assist every man requiring aid or encouragement. Mr. Walsh from his place in the Assembly and by his personal active petition to the Government secured very many concessions for his people, and to-day their appreciation is shown by the strong support given him and his colleagues by all sections of the District. Under the incoming administration Mr. Walsh will probably be a portfolio minister, probably that of Agriculture and Mines, a position which he is well qualified to fill. Being a practical miner he will no doubt be able to suggest many improvements in the mining laws to help the men working in the mines already existing and the new ones like St. George's Coal Fields and Silver Cliff, which will soon be in full operation. Placentia and St. Mary's District is to be congratulated on having three such strong, well qualified men to represent it, and no doubt the popular esteem in which they are held will be shown in the unprecedented vote that will be given them on polling day. The Bennett party has very hard working, zealous men in its ranks when the welfare and interest of their constituents is concerned, but we think that they all concede the palm to Mr. Walsh for his untiring and self-sacrificing efforts in the cause of his people. In the House and out of the House he worked day and night to help his constituents. He stood by them and refused all sorts of tempting offers that if accepted would put him on easy street, but would not leave his people who trusted him in the lurch. He resisted all offers and gave away his last dollar to help his men. A sealer from his district was going to the seafishery this spring and had no "bunk" to lie on. "Billy" Walsh took the mistress from his own bed and gave the man. This story was told the writer by the sealer on Water Street this week, when he returned from the seafishery. It would take a whole page to enumerate the many acts of self-sacrifice done by this big hearted man, who with his colleagues is now seeking re-election. We are confident that his constituents will appreciate him properly and will recognize that in all their history they never had a man so zealous and hard-working as Mr. Walsh to look after their interests.

An ordinary cork about two inches in diameter is useful in cleaning white grapes, diced celery, chopped apples and chopped walnut meats.
