ENGLAND'S BIG VICTORY AT CRICKET.

MELBOURNE, Australia, Feb. 18.-By an innings and 29 runs England won the fourth test cricket match of the present series and their first test match with an Australian eleven since 1912, at Kennington Oval. The game was brought to a sudden and dramatic finish by the collapse of the Australian batsmen, which considering the easy wicket, was surprising.

Australia had followed on for their second innings, of which they had already lost four wickets, when they met disaster. Tate, the clever young bowler from Sussex, was the chief instrument of destruction. He bowled magnificently, and was materially helped by two fine catches by Strudwick, who was in brilliant form.

Taylor, who yesterday helped the Australians with 59 not out, was bowled in the fifth over to-day when he reached 68. He was the highest Australian scorer in both innings, having 86 to his credit in the first. Right to Kill Trespassers

EXPLAINED BY LORD CHIEF

JUSTICE.

The right of a man to kill a trespasser in his house was explained by the Lord Chief Justice in the Court of Criminal Appeal when the court quashed the conviction of Israel James Hussey, a colored man, who was sentenced at the Centrale Criminal Court to twelve months' hard labor

for unlawfully wounding. It was stated that an attempt was made to eject Hussey and his wife from their room. Hammers were thrown at Hussey through a hole under the door panet, and he fired a revolver three times to frighten the attackers. His assailants were injured. A pamphlet entitled, "The New Rent Act Explained," was found in Hussey's pocket. .

"The law is," said the Lord Chief Justice, "that in defence of his house the owner or his family may kill a trespasser who would forcibly dispossess him, in the same manner as he might by law kill in self-defence a defending his house he need not retreat, as in other cases of self-defence. have been a miscarriage of justice."
