OPENING GAME TIE CUP SERIES.**ST. BON'S VS. TERRA NOVA.**

Only a small gathering of spectators witnessed the opening game of the Tie Cup Series, at the Prince's Rink last night.

The contesting teams were the St. Bon's and Terra Nova, and the honours went to St. Bon's, in a scrappy game, by a score of three goals to their opponent's two.

Both teams had several changes in their line ups. Raymond Halley, who did duty between the post for St. Bon's last year, made his appearance in goal for the Terra Nova, whilst M. Power turned out and held down right wing for his team.

For St. Bon's, Sid and Claude Fraser made their first appearance in senior company and they proved quite an addition to the Blue and Gold team.

First Period.

Referee Tobin called the players together at 7.30 and from the drop of the puck the Terras staged a bombardment on their opponent's goal.

For some minutes Phelan and Company were given a busy time keeping the rubber out of danger, and many were the narrow escapes.

Furlong succeeded in making a getaway and saw play quickly transfer to the other end. The puck broke up the play, and made a speedy run, but the shot went wild. Play was of a give and take nature for some minutes, with both sides exerting every effort to score.

The first goal of the evening came after ten minutes of play when Halley made a rink length run and passed to Cahill, who notched a beauty from the left wing. Little or no excitement prevailed in the play during the balance of the period. Players were roaming here, there and everywhere, and the exhibition handed out was considered very poor.

Furlong notched up No. 2 for St. Bon's in this period by a long shot.

Second Period.

Upon resumption of play the teams got in some good work, and both goalkeepers were kept on the qui vie. Several good individual runs were made by Peters and Canning of the Terras, and Furlong and Phelan for St. Bon's, but no goals resulted.

Two minutes from the opening of this period Halley took control and stick-handled his way through and, from a mix-up in

front of the Terras goal Fraser

knocked the rubber from a rebound. The Terras, quite undisturbed, pressed harder than ever, but try as they would, Ryan always managed to be in the desired position.

Two minutes later Field captured the rubber from a face-off and sent a well directed shot which glanced off Halley's arm into the net. For the balance of this period play was of a give and take nature, with much slashing by players of both sides.

The gong sounded with the score standing, St. Bon's 3; Terras 1.

Third Period

Play during the final period was, if anything, better than the first two. St. Bon's forwards combined nicely on several occasions, and it was only through the stalwart defence set up by the Terras that scoring at times was frustrated.

Phelan, Furlong and Canning featured in the play all through, and many were the narrow escapes on the opposing goals.

The only goal scored in this period was by Canning, for the Terras, on a pass from Gillies. It was a pretty play and the goal was well earned.

Despite the efforts of both teams nothing happened, and the final gong sounded leaving St. Bon's the victors by 3 goals to 2.

NOTES

There was only one penalty handed out for the night, and that was Skinner, of St. Bon's.

Hooking of sticks and holding on was resorted to by players of both teams last night. It may not look bad but it is, nevertheless, an infringement of the rules, and the players must be checked by the referees.

The Evening Telegram**Right to Kill Trespassers****EXPLAINED BY LORD CHIEF JUSTICE.**

The right of a man to kill a trespasser in his house was explained by the Lord Chief Justice in the Court of Criminal Appeal when the court quashed the conviction of Israel James Hussey, a colored man, who was sentenced at the Central Criminal Court to twelve months' hard labor for unlawfully wounding.

It was stated that an attempt was made to eject Hussey and his wife from their room. Hammers were thrown at Hussey through a hole under the door panel, and he fired a revolver three times to frighten the attackers. His assailants were injured. A pamphlet entitled, "The New Rent Act Explained," was found in Hussey's pocket.

LAW DEFINED.

"The law is," said the Lord Chief Justice, "that in defence of his house the owner or his family may kill a trespasser who would forcibly dispossess him, in the same manner as he might by law kill in self-defence a man who attacked him personally, with this distinction, however, that in defending his house he need not retreat, as in other cases of self-defence.
