## EVERYTHING BUT WEATHER

There Was an Excellent Start  
Made in the Bonsel  
Yesterday

### BIG ATTENDANCE AND KEEN COMPETITION

But the ice failed on One Rink  
and the Chinook is Threaten-  
ing the Other

The second annual bonsel of the  
Alberta branch of the Royal Caledo-  
nian Curling association was open-  
ed yesterday in the Victoria and  
Calgary rinks. The curling was not  
up to the average on account of the  
soft and rough ice.

The curling in the Victoria rink  
had to be called off, as towards the  
end of the day the ice became too  
soft.

The water dripping from the roof  
of the Calgary rink made the ice  
very rough and it could not be de-  
pended on for a fine shot. At times  
it was difficult to put the stones all  
the way up the ice.

The feature of the day was the  
curling of the "Kids' Rink." They  
were handicapped greatly as it re-  
quired all their strength to send the  
stones over the hog.

The game between Whitacre's and  
Vincent's rink (the kids) was the  
best one of the day. Every end was  
a hard fought battle, but to the  
surprise of the old timers the young-  
sters kept their nerve and were very  
close up at the finish.

Young Harris made some beautiful  
shots in the fourth end, sending  
down a stone past two guards and  
lying to within three inches of the  
tee. The same shot gave his rink a  
tally of one-end against three of his  
opponents' stones.

Mr. Stephenson of Wetaskiwin  
played a grand game against Ram-  
say of Calgary, defeating him by 36  
to 1, and is pretty sure to finish  
very near the top.

On every side were heard regrets  
at the absence of the Golden curlers,  
who have always made some very  
interesting games in the past bon-  
spiels.

One very good feature of the bon-  
spiel is that no two rinks from the  
same town are drawn against one  
another, with the exception of Cal-  
gary. The latter, having so many  
rinks entered, were bound to clash  
between themselves.

Archie McKillop's rink is a very  
promising one and should it meet  
Stephenson's rink of Wetaskiwin  
there will be a very interesting and  
hard fought game.

The draws in the Grand Challenge  
and Walkerville competitions gave  
satisfaction to all.

The rink attendants were working  
overtime trying to keep a fair sheet  
of ice, and at the same time smooth-  
ing off the lumps.

The game between Sheppard of  
Strathcona and Freeze of Calgary  
proved to be a very close match, at  
one time everything seemed to be for  
Freeze, but a few clever shots by  
Mr. Sheppard won the game for him.

The showing of Fletcher's rink  
against McKillop's was a great dis-  
appointment to the northern men,  
but he was unfortunate in getting up  
against one of the crack rinks of the  
bonspiel.

John Mosley's rink went down to  
defeat, but he got in the jewelry  
class on a toss.

After a cold blast lasting four or  
five weeks it was rather unfortunate  
for the curlers that the chinook  
came. However, though the curling  
may not be up to the mark, the  
sport is as keen and the poorer rink  
gets a better show to win out.
