"RECIPROCITY" As Viewed from a Republican Stand

t—Some Reasons for the Failure of Canada's Commissioners. of Canada's Commissioners.

New York, Feb. 24.—At the annual dinner of the New York Board of Trade and Transportation at Delmonicos this evening speeches were made by prominent personages. Gen. J. W. Foster, the gentleman who, with Secretary Blaine, met the Canadian reciprocity commissioners at Washington recently, and who has negotiated the reciprocity reading with the until ated the reciprocity treaties with the vari-ous nations under the McKinley Act, made

ous nations under the McKinley Act, made some remarks on "reciprocity," in the course of which he said:

"With our tropical neighbors, whose products are dissimilar to ours reciprocity is a simple matter, but when we come to deal with a country like Canada, having thousands of miles of coterminous territory and with like products and industries, the question becomes more complex. But this is not the insuperable difficulty; the fact that Canada does not possess the right of negotiating her own treaties but must have them negotiated for her by a distant power which is controlled by conomic principles different from those of both the United States and Canada constitutes the chief barrier to any arrangement, so long as barrier to any arrangement, so long as other interests than those of Canada are to other interests than those of Canada are to control negotiations for commercial relations. With such of our neighbors as recognize American (in its broadest sense) as paramount to European influence on this hemisphere, to all such countries we should open the doors of trade as wide and as freely as the interests of our own established industries will permit. Beyond that the spirit of genuine Americanism does not require nor permit us to go."
