### COLLECT THE PENALTY. Mr. Tate, M. P., is understood to have

taken action against Mr. Thomas Mc-Greevy, M. P., for breach of the act providing for the independence of Parliament. The law enacts that for each day that a man sits in Parliament while he is a Govemment contractor he shall be liable for a \$200 fine. If Uncle Thomas has been in Parliament for 60 days, during each of the nine years he confessed to have pocketed from \$10,000 to \$12,000 a year for the use of a vessel that cost him \$16,000, he may be fined the enormous sum of over \$1,000,000. He is rich, but he may not be worth that amount. It is clear that for his duplicity, perjury, and wholesale boodling, he should be punished in any way that the law can get at him If by way of his pocket, so much the better, especially if some portion of the accumulated plunder is diverted to the man who despite the opposition of his party leaders, has exposed the corrupt gang. ## MISTAKES IN IDENTITY.

The positive assurance which Mrs. Hartel, of this city, has obtained that the body found near Toronto is that of her missing husband may lead to an effort to fully establish the identity. If this is not undertaken, there will always remain a doubt on the matter, for it is a curious fact that it is generally most difficult to secure the positive identification of a dead body even when the remains are well preserved. When the body of an unknown person is found, it often happens that two or three people will appear and each identify the body as that of some relative or acquaintance. It afterwards turns out that they were entirely mistaken in their identifications. The dead woman who recently committed suicide in Yonkers N. Y., was a case of this kind. Her body was identified two or three times, and the coroner's jury actually pronounced it to be that of a woman who was then and still is alive. The girl murdered near Ridgewood, L. WHEN FRUITS ARE INJURIOUS. The healthfulness of fruits and the need of making them a regular part of daily diet during the heated season are frequently in sisted upon, but we are less often reminded of the poisonous character of unripe fruit, and the changes it undergoes in the process of maturing. Most people who complain that fruit disagrees with them will find that if it is eaten only when perfectly ripe it will leave no ill effects. The acid con tained in nearly all fruits in process of growth is usually burtful, causing irritation and a violent effort on the part of the system to relieve itself of the offending matter. An unripe peach contains a large amount of prussic acid, and, judging from their effects on the vital economy of smal boys, green plums, pears, and apples con tain acids equally deleterious. An additional week or two of sunshine is generally al that is needed to turn these poisonous vegetable acids into delicious and whole-

The tannic acid which puckers the mouth of the too early eater of persimmons is the ame substance which, when obtained from hemlock bark and sumac, is used for tan ning leather, and it is claimed to be the in digestible element in the unripe coffee bean. Those who are unable to drink coffee on account of its producing bad effects are advised to buy their coffee in the green state, and let it lie before browning till fully ripe. It will gradually turn from a pea green to a dirty yellow, when it is fit for browning. From three to four years is the time given to fully free coffee from its tannic acid, although there are in use artificial methods for eliminating the

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
