Its' Mother Leaves the Infant in London, and New No One Wants It.

The circumstances and facts of the case are these: About two months ago a young woman gave birth to a male child at the City Hospital, under distressing circumstances. Mrs. Flora McGinnis, 202 About three weeks ago the child took ill with vomiting and diarrhea, and from this the child has been gradually starving to death, not because Mrs. McGinnis has not been feeding it, but because the little one was unable to digest what was given it. For the most part it has been given prepared baby's food. Mrs. McGinnis says the mother of the child took her address and promised to write concerning the child's welfare, but no word has been received. Mrs. McGinnis, to a reporter this morning, said that she had heard the child's mother was the daughter of a respectable store-keeper near Peterboro, who wrote to a friend about three weeks ago, and she called to see the child, but would not reveal the parentage. Medical attendance was given the child, but with apparently little benefit, and it is now one of the most heartrending sights that ever met human gaze. Dr. Hutchinson, the medical health officer, made application to the hospital trustees this morning to have the child admitted. This was refused, on the ground that the baby was under age, as by the rules no one can be admitted under 6 months. Provision was made, how-ever, to admit the child if it were acompanied by a nurse. This Dr. Hutchinson thought he could easily secure, and said he would have the child removed to the hospital this af
