At the Court House on Saturday, a meeting of the East Middlesex Farmers' Institute was held. Mr. John O'Brien, of London township, president of the institute, carried the chair, and there were present;

The large audience present were delighted with the vigorous and clear exposition of this phase of the controversy.

Mr. Cullen chose as his text Jeremiah, xxxv., 18-19. His theme was "The Rechabite's Reward," and he drew from the passage the strong lesson that total abstinence principles had here been strikingly rewarded. Mr. Cullen divided his address into seven propositions. They were as follows:

1. Total abstinence is a safe practice for any man to follow. "If you do not drink you cannot get drunk" seems to be a trite utterance. Yet it is astrue as it is trite, and as sublime in its simplicity as it is simple in its application.

2. Total abstinence is a respectable habit. In an intelligent community, who ever knew an honorable citizen to suffer loss of character because he was a total abstainer from all kinds of narcotics? No man! The common sense of humanity is in favor of the practice of legitimate self-denial on the part of man, either for his own sake or for the sake of his/fellows. In many fustances even the victims of unnecessary stimulants themselves respect the men who will not follow their example and decline to become their associates in so-called moderation and dangerous self-indulgence.

3. Total abstinence from strong drink preserves and improves health. Without it the highest physical development cannot be reached. Tom Sayers, that king of English pugilists, never touched spirits, ale or porter when training for a prize fight. He reveled in cold water and in dumb-bell exercise. Cold water made him a Sampson. Alcohol killed him. Both in the frozen regions of the north, in those dangerous exploring expeditions, and in the sweltering heat of the tropics, total abstinence has proved its superiority over moderate drinking.
